

REQUESTED ACTION

The petitioner requests Final Plat approval for a one-lot 2.104-acre subdivided from two existing tracts totaling 35.32 acres in the AG-1 Agriculture Zoning District in Section 30 of Pesotum Township.

The proposed lot meets all Zoning Ordinance requirements. The proposed subdivision appears to meet all of the minimum subdivision standards, but the Final Plat does require two waivers. Approval at this time requires the following waivers (see Attachment H: Draft Findings):

1. Waive the requirement of paragraph 9.1.2 q. for not showing percolation data for both proposed lot on the face of the Final Plat.
2. Waive the requirement of paragraph 9.1.2 r. for certification of the proposed lot and soil characteristics for private septic disposal systems to be recorded on the Final Plat.

BACKGROUND

The petitioner would like to create a residential lot separate from the farmland in production. All available exceptions from the Illinois Plat Act (765 ILCS 205) have been used in prior lot splits, so they need approval for a Minor Subdivision to split the property.

MINIMUM SUBDIVISION STANDARDS AND AREA GENERAL PLAN APPROVAL

The Minimum Subdivision Standards were added to the Area General Plan section of the *Subdivision Regulations* on July 8, 2004, in Subdivision Case 175-04, Part B, which also added the requirement that any subdivision needed Area General Plan approval except for subdivisions pursuant to a Rural Residential Overlay (RRO) map amendment. Area General Plan approval is only by ELUC. The subject subdivision is not pursuant to an RRO amendment and so Area General Plan requirements are applicable.

Attachment C reviews the conformance of the proposed subdivision with those standards, and the proposed subdivision appears to meet all of the minimum subdivision standards.

APPLICABLE ZONING REGULATIONS

The subject property is zoned AG-1 Agriculture (see Attachment A: Zoning Map). The proposed lot meets the minimum lot requirements; Table 1 below summarizes those requirements:

NATURAL RESOURCE REPORT / SOIL CONDITIONS

A Natural Resource Information Report from Champaign County Soil and Water Conservation District dated June 14, 2021 was received on July 2, 2021 (Attachment E).

Regarding soil suitability for septic systems, the report states, “The soils on the subject property are not suitable sanitary facilities. It is advised to perform onsite investigations with a professional to determine construction strategy before moving forward.” The proposed lot already has a septic system, which is undergoing review by the Champaign County Health Department.

Regarding soil suitability for development, the report states, “The soils on the subject property are not suitable or have limitations for dwellings and small commercial buildings. It is advised to consult with a professional to determine safety and quality of current and future construction projects.” The proposed lot is a farmstead that has existed for decades, and no new construction is anticipated.

Regarding surface drainage, the report says that surface runoff is low to negligible for the two soil types on the propose lot, and ponding is brief to none.

Regarding cultural, plant, and animal resources, the report states, “The Illinois Natural Heritage Database contains no record of state-listed threatened or endangered species, Illinois Natural Area Inventory sites, dedicated Illinois Nature Preserves, or registered Land and Water Reserves in the vicinity of the project location.”

DRAINAGE, STORMWATER MANAGEMENT, AND FLOOD HAZARD STATUS

The subject property is in the Two-Mile Slough Drainage District. No part of the proposed lot contains any portion of a drainage ditch right of way.

The Subsidiary Drainage Plat received December 11, 2020 (see Attachment D), shows existing contours on the proposed lot. The highest contour elevation on proposed Lot 101 outside the road-right of way is approximately 682 feet mean sea level (msl), located in the southwest corner. The lowest contour on Lot 101 is 680 feet msl located in the northeast corner. Slope between the highest and lowest contours is 0.86%.

No part of the proposed lot is in the Special Flood Hazard Area (SFHA), per FEMA FIRM Panel 17019C0550D, with an effective date of October 2, 2013.

The proposed subdivision is exempt from the Storm Water Drainage Plan per Section 4.2 of *the Storm Water Management and Erosion Control Ordinance*.

PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS

No public improvements are indicated or required in this subdivision.

SOIL SUITABILITY FOR SEPTIC SYSTEMS

There is an existing septic system for the existing dwelling on the proposed lot. Should a replacement system be needed, the permitting process for septic systems through the Champaign County Health Department requires a soil analysis.

The report *Soil Potential Ratings for Septic Tank Absorption Fields, Champaign County, Illinois* (USDA Soil Conservation Service, 1979) established soil potential ratings as follows:

Very High Potential	Performance is above local standards; soil conditions are exceptionally favorable, installation costs are low, and there are no continuing soil limitations.
High Potential	Performance is at or above local standards; costs of measures for overcoming soil limitations are judged locally to be favorable in relation to the expected performance, and soil limitations continuing after corrective measures are installed do not detract appreciably from environmental quality.
Medium Potential	Performance is somewhat below local standards; costs of measures for overcoming soil limitations are high; soil limitations continuing after corrective measures are installed detract appreciably from environmental quality.
Low Potential	Performance is significantly below local standards; measures required to overcome soil limitations are very costly; soil limitations continuing after corrective measures are installed detract appreciably from environmental quality.
Very Low Potential	Performance is much below local standards; there are severe soil limitations for which economically feasible measures are unavailable; soil limitations continuing after corrective measures are installed seriously detract from environmental quality.

The proposed lot consists of the following soils with their soil potential rating class:

- 152A Drummer silty clay loam: “Low” soil potential rating
- 154A Flanagan silt loam: “Medium” soil potential rating

In proposed Lot 101, the most suitable soil is 154A Flanagan silt loam, which covers about 12% of the proposed lot.

A Soil Evaluation Report was prepared by Robert McLeese, Certified Professional Soil Classifier, and

was received on July 20, 2021 (Attachment F). Mr. McLeese reviewed soils from borings west of the house on proposed Lot 101.

- Soil boring 1 had an estimated depth to the seasonal high-water table of 29 inches, and the soil is “somewhat poorly drained.”
- Soil boring 2 had an estimated depth to the seasonal high-water table of 28 inches, and the soil is “somewhat poorly drained.”
- Soil boring 3 had an estimated depth to the seasonal high-water table of 28 inches, and the soil is “somewhat poorly drained.”

Suitability Standard 5 from Section 6.1.5 a. of the Subdivision Ordinance states, “When a connected public sanitary sewer is not available, the septic suitability of the soils occupied by each proposed lot must be the most suitable soils on the larger tract from which the subdivision is proposed.” A review of the property and septic location was received on July 21, 2021 from Jeff Blackford, Environmental Health Programs Coordinator at Champaign County Public Health Department – see Attachment G. The review included the following requirements:

- Based on the soil borings submitted, a septic field sized at 385-740 square feet per bedroom would need to be installed. The exact sizing will be based on the maximum depth of the septic field.
- Due to a seasonal water table found at the site, a curtain drain would be required to be installed around a conventional septic system two feet below the bottom of the field. If an aeration unit is installed before the subsurface field, a curtain drain would need to be installed if the seasonal water table is within a foot from the bottom of the field.
- There is a possible tile starting in the center of lot IO 1. The septic field will need to be located at least ten feet from this.









Summary and Concerns of the Board

1. The soils on the subject property are not suitable sanitary facilities. It is advised to perform onsite investigations with a professional to determine construction strategy before moving forward. See pages 7-9.
2. The soils on the subject property are not suitable or have limitations for dwellings and small commercial buildings. It is advised to consult with a professional to determine safety and quality of current and future construction projects. See pages 7-9.
3. The subject property is located in *70. Two Mile Slough* drainage district. Please contact drainage district officials for questions or concerns regarding drainage management.
4. The average Land Evaluation (LE) score for this site is: 100. See pages 12-13.

Soil Information

The soil information comes from the United States Department of Agriculture Natural Resources Conservation Service (USDA-NRCS) Soil Survey of Champaign County. This information is important to all parties involved in determining the suitability of the proposed land use change. Each polygon is given a number with letters, which represents its soil type, slope, flooding, etc., and is then called a map unit. Each soil map unit has limitations for a variety of land uses, which are explained using interpretations.



Introduction to Soil Interpretations

Non-agricultural soil interpretations are ratings that help engineers, planners, and others understand how soil properties influence behavior when used for nonagricultural uses such as building site development or construction materials. This report gives ratings for proposed uses in terms of limitations and restrictive features. The tables list only the most restrictive features. Other features may need treatment to overcome soil limitations for a specific purpose.

Ratings come from the soil's "natural" state, that is, no unusual modification occurs other than that which is considered normal practice for the rated use. Even though soils may have limitations, an engineer may alter soil features or adjust building plans for a structure to compensate for most degrees of limitations.

However, most of these practices are costly. The final decision in selecting a site for a land use generally involves weighing the costs for site preparation and maintenance.

Soil properties influence the development of building sites, including the selection of the site, the design of the structure, construction, performance after construction, and maintenance. Soil limitation ratings of slight, moderate, and severe are given for the types of proposed improvements that are listed or inferred by the petitioner as entered on the report application and/or zoning petition. The most common type of building limitation this report gives limitations ratings for is septic systems. It is understood that engineering practices can overcome most limitations for buildings with and without basements, and small commercial buildings. Organic soils, when present on the subject property, are referenced in the hydric soils section of the report.

The area of development will be susceptible to erosion both during and after construction. Any areas left bare for more than 7 days should be temporarily seeded or mulched and permanent vegetation needs to be established as soon as possible.

Limitation Ratings

1. *Not limited*- This soil has favorable properties for the intended use. The degree of limitation is minor and easy to overcome. Those involved can expect good performance and low maintenance.
2. *Somewhat limited*- This soil has moderately favorable properties for the intended use. Special planning, design, or maintenance can overcome this degree of limitation. During some part of the year, the expected performance is less desirable than for soils rated "*not limited*."
3. *Very limited*- This soil has one or more properties that are unfavorable for the rated use. These may include the following: steep slopes, bedrock near the surface, flooding, high shrink-swell potential, a seasonally high water table, or low strength. This degree of limitation generally requires major soil reclamation, special design, or intensive maintenance, which in most situations is difficult and costly.

Soil Interpretations

Sanitary Facilities

The table below shows the degree and kind of soil limitations that affect septic tank absorption fields and sewage lagoons.

Septic Tank Absorption Fields: Areas in which effluent from a septic tank is distributed into the soil through subsurface tiles or perforated pipe. The ratings are based on soil properties, site features, and observed performance of the soils. Permeability, high water table, depth to bedrock or a cemented pan, and flooding affect absorption of the effluent. Large stones and bedrock or a cemented pan interfere with installation. Unsatisfactory performance of septic tank absorption fields, including excessively slow absorption of effluent, surfacing of effluent, and hillside seepage can affect public health. There must be unsaturated soil material beneath the absorption field to filter the effluent effectively.

For the subject property: 100% of the soils on the property are very limited for the use of septic tank absorption fields and special design is required for any septic tank absorption field.

Building Site Development

The table below shows the degree and the kind of soil limitations that affect dwellings with or without basements and small commercial buildings.

Dwellings and Small Commercial Buildings: Structures built on a shallow foundation on undisturbed soil that are three stories or less. The ratings are based on soil properties, site features, and observed performance of the soils. High water table, depth to bedrock or to a cemented pan, large stones, slope, and flooding effect the ease of excavation, construction, and maintenance.

Soil Water (Wetness) Features

This section gives estimates of various soil water (wetness) features that should be taken into consideration when reviewing engineering for a land use project.

Hydrologic Soil Groups (HSGs): The groups are based on estimates of runoff potential. Soils are assigned to one of four groups according to the rate of water infiltration when the soils are not protected by vegetation, are thoroughly wet, and receive precipitation from long-duration storms.

- Group A: Soils having a high infiltration rate (low runoff potential) when thoroughly wet. These consist mainly of deep, well drained to excessively drained sands or gravelly sands. These soils have a high rate of water transmission.
- Group B: Soils having a moderate infiltration rate when thoroughly wet. These consist chiefly of moderately deep or deep, moderately well drained or well drained soils that have moderately fine texture to moderately coarse texture. These soils have a moderate rate of water transmission.
- Group C: Soils having a slow infiltration rate when thoroughly wet. These consist chiefly of soils having a layer that impedes the downward movement of water or soils of moderately fine texture or fine texture. These soils have a slow rate of water transmission.
- Group D: Soils having a very slow infiltration rate (high runoff potential) when thoroughly wet. These consist chiefly of clays that have a high shrink-swell potential, soils that have a high water table, soils that have a claypan or clay layer at or near the surface, and soils that are shallow over nearly impervious material. These soils have a very slow rate of water transmission.

Note: if a soil is assigned to a dual hydrologic group (A/D, B/D, or C/D) the first letter is for drained areas and the second is for undrained areas.

Surface Runoff: Refers to the loss of water from an area by flow over the land surface. Surface runoff classes are based upon slope, climate, and vegetative cover and indicates relative runoff for very specific conditions (it is assumed that the surface of the soil is bare and that the retention of surface water resulting from the irregularities in the ground surface is minimal). The classes are negligible, very low, low, medium, high, and very high.

Water Table: Refers to a saturated zone in the soil and the data indicates, by month, depth to the top (upper limit) and base (lower limit) of the saturated zone in most years. These estimates are based upon observations of the water table at selected sites and on evidence of a saturated zone (grayish colors or mottles, called redoximorphic features) in the soil. Note: a saturated zone that lasts for less than a month is not considered a water table.

Ponding: Refers to standing water in a closed depression and the data indicates duration and frequency of ponding.

- Duration: expressed as *very brief* if less than 2 days, *brief* if 2 to 7 days, *long* if 7 to 30 days and *very long* if more than 30 days.
- Frequency: expressed as *none* (ponding is not possible), *rare* (unlikely but possible under unusual weather conditions), *occasional* (occurs, on average, once or less in 2 years), *frequent* (occurs, on average, more than once in 2 years).

Flooding: The temporary inundation of an area caused by overflowing streams, by runoff from adjacent slopes, or by tides. Water standing for short periods after rainfall or snowmelt is not considered flooding, and water standing in swamps and marshes is considered ponding rather than flooding.

- Duration: Expressed as *extremely brief* if 0.1 hour to 4 hours; *very brief* if 4 hours to 2 days; *brief* if 2 to 7 days; *long* if 7 to 30 days; and *very long* if more than 30 days.
- Frequency: Expressed as *none* (flooding is not probable), *very rare* (very unlikely but possible under extremely unusual weather conditions (chance of flooding is less than 1% in any year)), *rare* (unlikely but possible under unusual weather conditions (chance of flooding is 1 to 5% in any year)), *occasional* (occurs infrequently under normal weather conditions (chance of flooding is 5 to 50% in any year but is less than 50% in all months in any year)), and *very frequent* (likely to occur very often under normal weather conditions (chance of flooding is more than 50% in all months of any year)).

Note: The information is based on evidence in the soil profile. In addition, consideration is also given to local information about the extent and levels of flooding and the relation of each soil on the landscape to historic floods. Information on the extent of flooding based on soil data is less specific than that provided by detailed engineering surveys that delineate flood-prone areas at specific flood frequency levels.

Hydric Soils

Hydric soils by definition have seasonal high water at or near the soil surface and/or have potential flooding or ponding problems. All hydric soils range from poorly suited to unsuitable for building. Soil maps may not be small enough to show inclusions of hydric soils, so it is important to consult a soil scientist if building residential areas on hydric soils or soils with hydric inclusions.


On most agricultural soils in the county that are poorly or somewhat poorly drained, subsurface agriculture drainage tile occurs. This expedites drainage but must be maintained and undisturbed so the soil does not return to its original hydrologic condition.

The Champaign County SWCD recommends the following for an intense land use, such as a subdivision:

1. A topographical survey with 1-foot contour intervals to define the flood area.
2. An intensive soil survey to define locations of hydric inclusions.
3. A drainage tile survey to locate tiles that must be preserved.

Soil Erosion and Sediment Control

Erosion is the wearing away of the soil by water, wind, and other forces and a soil’s erodibility is mainly determined by the following properties: soil texture, slope, soil structure, soil organic matter content. Soil erosion threatens the nation’s soil productivity and contributes to pollutants in waterways. Sediment entering creeks, rivers, and lakes degrade water quality and reduce capacity, which increases the risk of flooding and disrupts ecosystems. Sediment also carries other possible pollutants, such as chemicals and metals, by adhering to the sediment’s surface.

Erosion Control at Construction Sites

Construction sites can experience 20 to 200 tons/acre/year of soil loss, which is greater than other land uses, like agriculture, averaging 4-5 tons/acre/year. It is extremely important that the developer employ Best Management Practices, like the ones listed below, to help reduce soil erosion and protect water quality during and after construction.

- **Silt Fencing:** A woven geotextile fabric stretched across and attached to supporting posts used to intercept sediment-laden runoff from small drainage areas of disturbed soil. The purpose is to filter out sediment from runoff before it enters a water body.
- **Construction Road Stabilization:** The stabilization of temporary construction access routes, subdivision roads, on-site vehicle transportation routes, and construction parking areas with stone immediately after grading the area to reduce erosion.
- **Vegetative Cover:** One of the most important means to control runoff is to plant temporary vegetation around the perimeter of the construction site. This provides a natural buffer to filter sediment and chemicals. The CCSWCD recommends that temporary grass be planted (i.e. smooth brome grass, oats, cereal rye) to help protect soil from erosion during construction.

EPA Stormwater Pollution Prevention Plan (SWPPP) Reference Tool

EPA requires a plan to control storm water pollution for all construction sites over 1 acre in size. *A Guide for Construction Sites* is a reference tool for construction site operators who must prepare a SWPPP to obtain NPDES permit coverage for their storm water discharges. Prime Farmland Soils

Prime farmland soils are an important resource to Champaign County. Some of the most productive soils in the world occur locally. Each soil map unit in the United States is assigned a prime or non-prime rating. Urban or built-up land on prime farmland soils is not prime farmland.

The Land Evaluation and Site Assessment System

Decision-makers in Champaign County use the Land Evaluation and Site Assessment (LESA) system to determine the suitability of a land use change and/or a zoning request as it relates to agricultural land. The LESAs system was developed by the USDA-NRCS and takes into consideration local conditions, such as physical characteristics of the land, compatibility of surrounding land uses, and urban growth factors. The LESAs system is a two-step procedure:

- Land Evaluation (LE) – the soils of a given area are rated and placed in groups ranging from the best to worst suited for a stated agricultural use. The best group is assigned a value of 100 and is based on data from the Champaign County Soil Survey. The Champaign County LE designates soils with a

score of 91 to 100 as best prime farmland, as reported in Bulletin 811 Optimum Crop Productivity Ratings for Illinois Soils. Best Prime Farmland consists of:

- a) Soils identified as agricultural value groups 1, 2, 3, and/or 4
 - b) Soils that, in combination on a subject site, have an average LE of 91 or higher
 - c) Any site that includes a significant amount (10% or more of the area proposed to be developed) of agriculture value groups 1, 2, 3, and/or 4
- Site Assessment (SA) – the site is numerically evaluated according to important factors that contribute to the quality of the site. Each factor selected is assigned values in accordance with the local needs and objectives.

The Champaign County LESA system is designed to provide officials with a systematic objective means to numerically rate a site in terms of its agricultural importance.

- To assist officials in evaluating the proposed conversion of farmland on a parcel or site in zoning cases that include farmland conversion to a non-agricultural land use.
- To assist in the review of state and federal projects for compliance with the Illinois Farmland Preservation Act and the Federal Farmland Protection Policy Act in terms of their impact on important farmland.

Note: A land evaluation (LE) score will be compiled for every project property, but a site assessment score is not applicable in most cases, making the full LESA score unavailable.



Topographic Information

United States Geologic Survey (USGA) topographic maps give information on elevation, which are important mostly to determine slope, drainage direction, and watershed information. Elevation determines the area of impact of floods. Slope information determines steepness and erosion potential. Drainage directions determine where water leaves the subject property, possibly impacting surrounding natural resources.




Watershed Information

Watershed information is given when land use is changed to a subdivision type of development on parcels greater than 10 acres. A watershed is an area of land that drains to an associated water resource, such as a wetland, river, or lake. Rainwater carries pollutants through watersheds, impacting natural resources and people living downstream. Residents can minimize this impact by being aware of their environment and implications of their activities.

The following are recommendations to developers for protection of watersheds:

- Preserve open space
- Maintain wetlands as part of development
- Use natural water management
- Prevent soil from leaving construction sites
- Protect subsurface drainage
- Use native vegetation
- Retain natural features
- Mix housing and style types
- Decrease impervious surfaces
- Reduce area disturbed by mass grading
- Treat water where it falls


Floodplain and Wetland Information

Floodplain Information

A floodplain is defined as land adjoining a watercourse (riverine) or an inland depression (non-riverine) that is subject to periodic inundation by high water. Floodplains are important areas that demand protection since they have water storage and conveyance functions that affect upstream and downstream flows, water quality and quantity, and suitability of the land for human activity. Since floodplains play distinct and vital roles in the hydrologic cycle, development that interferes with their hydrologic and biologic functions should be carefully considered.

Flooding is dangerous to people and destructive to their properties. The following map can help developers and future homeowners to “sidestep” potential flooding or ponding problems. The Flood Insurance Rate Map (FIRM) was produced by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to define flood elevation adjacent to tributaries and major bodies of water that are superimposed onto a simplified USGS topographic map.

For the subject property: no portion of the property is in the floodplain.




Wetland Information

Wetlands function in many ways to provide numerous benefits to society and the environment, including flood control, cleanse water, recharge groundwater, and provide a wildlife habitat. However, approximately 95% of

the wetlands that were historically present in Illinois have been destroyed. It is crucial that we take steps to conserve current wetlands and reestablish new wetlands where once destroyed. Wetland determinations are made by a certified NRCS staff.

Wetland and Floodplain Regulations

Coordination: we recommend early coordination with the agencies BEFORE finalizing work plans. This allows the agencies to recommend measures to mitigate or compensate for adverse impacts. This could reduce time required to process necessary approvals and reduce expense.

Cultural and Animal Resources

Cultural Resources

The most common cultural resources found during changes in land use are historical properties or non-structural archaeological sites. These sites often extend below the soil surface and must be protected against disruption by development or other earth moving activity if possible. Cultural resources are non-renewable because there is no way to grow a site to replace a disrupted site. Landowners with historical properties on their land have ownership of that historical property. However, the State of Illinois owns all of the following: human remains, grave markers, burial mounds, and artifacts associated with graves and human remains. Non-grave artifacts from archaeological sites and historical buildings are the property of the landowner. The landowner may choose to disturb a historical property but may not receive federal or state assistance to do so. If an earth-moving activity disturbs human remains, the landowner must contact the county coroner within 48 hours.

The Illinois Historic Preservation Agency may require a Phase 1 Archaeological review to identify any cultural resources that may be on the site. The IHPA has not been contacted by the Champaign County SWCD. The applicant may need to contact the IHPA according to current Illinois law.

Animal Resources

According to the Illinois Endangered Species Protection Act & Illinois Natural Areas Preservation Act, state agencies or local units of government must consult Illinois Department of Natural Resources (IDNR) about proposed actions that they will authorize, fund, or perform. Private parties do not have to consult, but they are liable for prohibited taking of state-listed plants and animals or for adversely modifying a Nature Preserve or a Land and Water Preserve. Home rule governments may delegate this responsibility through duly enacted ordinances to the parties seeking authorization or funding of the action.

Ecologically Sensitive Areas

Biodiversity is the sum of total of all the plants, animals, fungi, and microorganisms in the world, or in a particular area that make up the fabric of the Earth and allow it to function. Biodiversity must be protected, as it is diminishing, which weakens entire natural systems. It is intrinsically valuable for an ecosystem to be biologically diverse to sustain ecosystem health and support life.

As part of the Natural Resources Information Report, staff checks if any nature preserves are in the general vicinity of the subject property. If there is a nature preserve in the area, then that resource will be identified as part of the report. The SWCD recommends that every effort be made to protect that resource. Such efforts should include but are not limited to erosion control, sediment control, stormwater management, and groundwater monitoring.






Glossary and Acronyms

Agriculture – The growing, harvesting, and storing of crops, including legumes, hay, grain, fruit; and truck or vegetables, including dairy, poultry, swine, sheep, beef cattle, pony and horse, fur, and fish and wildlife; farm buildings used for growing, harvesting, and preparing crop products for market, or for use on the farm; roadside stands, farm buildings for storing and protecting farm machinery and equipment from the elements, or for housing livestock or poultry and for preparing livestock or poultry products for market; farm dwellings occupied by farm owners, operators, tenants, or seasonal or year around hired farm workers.

ADT – average daily traffic that a local road normally receives, based upon records by the County Superintendent of Highways.

B.G. – below grade. Under the surface of the Earth.

Bedrock – indicates depth at which bedrock occurs. Also lists hardness as rippable or hard.

Flooding – indicates frequency, duration, and period during year when floods are likely to occur.

High Level Management – the application of effective practices adapted to different crops, soils, and climatic conditions. Such practices include providing for adequate soil drainage, protection from flooding, erosion and runoff control, near optimum tillage, and planting the correct kind and amount of high-quality seed. Weeds, diseases, and harmful insects are controlled. Favorable soil reaction and near-optimum levels of available nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium for individual crops are maintained. Efficient use is made of available crop residues, barnyard manure, and/or green manure crops. All operations, when combined efficiently and timely, can create favorable growing conditions and reduce harvesting losses (within limits imposed by weather).

High Water Table – a seasonal highwater table is a zone of saturation at the highest average depth during the wettest part of the year. May be apparent, perched, or artesian.

Water Table, Apparent – a thick zone of free water in the soil indicated by the level at which water stands in an uncased borehole after adequate time is allowed for adjustment in the surrounding soil.

Water Table, Artesian – a water table under hydrostatic head, generally beneath an impermeable layer. When layer is penetrated, the water level rises in the uncased borehole.

Water Table, Perched – a water table standing above an unsaturated zone, often separated from a lower wet zone by a dry zone.

Delineation – (for wetlands) a series of orange flags placed on the ground by a certified professional that outlines the wetland boundary on a parcel.

Determination – (for wetlands) a polygon drawn on a map using map information that gives an outline of a wetland.

Hydric Soil – soil that is saturated, flooded, or ponded long enough during the growing season to develop anaerobic conditions in the upper part (USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, 1987).

Intensive Soil Mapping – mapping done on a small, intensive scale than a modern soil survey to determine soil properties of a specific site, i.e. mapping for septic suitability.

Land Evaluation Site Assessment (L.E.S.A.) – LESA is a systematic approach for evaluating a parcel of land and to determine a numerical value for the parcel for farmland preservation purposes.

Modern Soil Survey – a soil survey is a field investigation of the soils of a specific area, supported by information from other sources. The kinds of soil in the survey area are identified and their extent is shown on a map. An accompanying report describes, defines, classifies, and interprets the soils. Interpretations predict the behavior of soils under different uses and the soils' response to management. Predictions are made for areas of soil at specific places. Soil information collected in a soil survey are useful in developing land use plans and alternatives.

Palustrine – name given to inland fresh water wetlands.

Permeability – values listed estimate the range of time it takes for downward movement of water in the major soil layers when saturated but allowed to drain freely. The estimates are based on soil texture,

soil structure, available data on permeability and infiltration tests, and observation of water movement through soils or other geologic materials.

PIQ – parcel in question

Potential Frost Action – damage that may occur to structures and roads due to ice lens formation, causing upward and lateral soil movement. Based primarily on soil texture and wetness.

Prime Farmland – lands that are best suited for food, feed, forage, fiber, and oilseed crops. It may be cropland, pasture, woodland, or other land, but it is not urban, built up land, or water areas. When well-managed, the soil qualities and moisture supply provide a sustained high yield of crops with minimum inputs of energy and economic resources in the least damage to the environment. Prime farmland has an adequate and dependable supply of moisture from precipitation or irrigation. The temperature and growing season are favorable. The level of acidity or alkalinity is acceptable. Prime farmland has few or no rocks and is permeable to water and air. It is not excessively erodible or saturated with water for long periods and is not frequently flooding during the growing season. The slope ranges from 0 to 5 percent. (USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service)

Productivity Indexes – express the estimated yields of the major grain crops in Illinois as a single percentage of the average yields obtained under basic management from several of the more productive soils in the state (Muscatine, Ipava, Sable, Lisbon, Drummer, Flanagan, Littleton, Elburn, Joy soil series). See Circular 1156 from the Illinois Cooperative Extension Service.

Seasonal – when used in reference to wetlands, indicates the area flooded only during a portion of the year.

Shrink-Swell Potential – indicates volume changes to be expected for the specific soil material with changes in moisture content.

Soil Mapping Unit – collection of soil and miscellaneous areas delineated in mapping. Generally, an aggregate of the delineations of many different bodies of a kind of soil or miscellaneous area but may consist of only one delineated body. Taxonomic class names and accompanying terms are used to name soil map units. They are described in terms of ranges of soil properties within the limits defined for tax and in terms of ranges of tax adjuncts and inclusions.

Soil Series – a group of soils formed from a type of parent material, having horizons that, except for texture of the surface horizon, are similar in all profile characteristics and in arrangement in the soil profile. Among these characteristics are color, texture, structure, reaction, consistence, mineralogy, and chemical composition.

Subsidence – applies mainly to organic soils after drainage. Soil material subsides due to shrinkage and oxidation.

Terrain – the area or surface over which a particular rock or group of rocks is prevalent.

Topsoil – portion of the soil profile where higher concentrations of organic material, fertility, bacterial activity, and plant growth take place. Depths of topsoil vary between soil types.

Watershed – an area of land that drains to an associated water resource, such as a wetland, river, or lake. Depending on the size and topography, watersheds can contain numerous tributaries, such as streams, ditches, and ponding areas, such as detention structures, natural ponds, or wetlands.

Wetland – an area that has a predominance of hydric soils that are inundated or saturated by surface or groundwater at a frequency and duration sufficient to support a prevalence of hydrophilic vegetation typically adapted for life in saturated soil conditions.



This letter is in regards to the proposed subdivision of a property located as being a part of the Southwest Quarter of Section 19 and the Northwest Quarter of Section 30, Township 17 North, Range 8 East of the Third Principal Meridian, Champaign County, Illinois. According to the Illinois *Plat Act* (765 ILCS 205/2), we are authorized to review the plat with respect to the private sewage disposal system.

The final approval of any replacement septic system for lot 101 will be based on the three soil borings located on the property. Based on the soil borings submitted, a septic field sized at 385-740 sq./ft. per bedroom would need to be installed. The exact sizing will be based on the maximum depth of the septic field. Due to a seasonal water table found at the site, a curtain drain would be required to be installed around a conventional septic system two feet below the bottom of the field. If an aeration unit is installed before the subsurface field, a curtain drain would need to be installed if the seasonal water table is within a foot from the bottom of the field.

There is a possible tile starting in the center of lot 101. The septic field will need to be located at least ten feet from this.

No septic construction permits will be issued for surface discharging systems on land that is subject to the Illinois *Plat Act* that was platted and approved after August 10, 2014.

DRAFT FINDINGS FOR WAIVERS OF FINAL PLAT REQUIREMENTS

1. The requested subdivision waivers of final plat requirements ***WILL NOT*** be detrimental to the public health, safety, or welfare or injurious to other property located in the area because:
 - A. **P&Z Staff received the Soil Evaluation Report by Robert McLeese, Certified Professional Soil Classifier, on July 20, 2021.**
 - B. **The proposed subdivision is for a proposed residential lot with an existing farmstead. The Plat and Soil Evaluation Report were sent to Champaign County Public Health Department for review. A review of the property and existing septic location was received on July 21, 2021 from Jeff Blackford, Environmental Health Programs Coordinator at Champaign County Public Health Department.**
2. Special conditions and circumstances ***DO*** exist which are unique to the property involved and are not applicable generally to other property, and granting the subdivision waivers of final plat requirements will not confer any special privilege to the subdivider because:
 - A. **This waiver is not prohibited by the Subdivision Regulations and could be requested for any subdivision with similar conditions.**
3. Particular hardships ***WILL*** result to the subdivider by carrying out the strict letter of the subdivision requirements sought to be waived because:
 - A. **Soil borings and percolation data are not shown on the Final Plat. The soil report identifies the soil characteristics for private septic disposal systems, but there is no certification on the Final Plat.**
 - B. **Requiring soil borings, percolation test data and the statement regarding suitability being recorded on the Final Plat would increase the subdivider's costs and slow down the approval process with no gain to public health or safety.**
4. The special conditions, circumstances, hardships, or practical difficulties ***DO NOT*** result from actions of the subdivider because:
 - A. **The Final Plat was prepared by an Illinois Professional Land Surveyor using a format that conforms to the current Illinois minimum standards for a plat, and inclusion of the soil data and septic certification is not a state-mandated minimum requirement on the Final Plat. PILOT HOMEOWNER OCCUPIED REHAB PROGRAM

OVERVIEW:

The Central Illinois Land Bank Authority's Homeowner Rehab Program will provide funds to income-eligible owner-occupants to assist with repair, rehabilitation, and reconstruction of their homes. The goal of this program is to help low-to-moderate income (LMI) homeowners in Champaign County afford necessary exterior repairs they might otherwise not be able to afford. These repairs are often essential to improving health, safety, livability, and value of the home and neighborhood.

This program, funded by County's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, will help CILBA and its project partners build a track record to successfully acquire annual state grant funding to cover this work. In order to successfully apply for and receive the funding, CILBA needs to build a well vetted and practiced process for home rehabs. Through access to Champaign County's ARPA Funds, we can help low-to-moderate income families in non-entitlement communities repair their homes, preserve housing stock, and build capacity for the program's longevity. (Entitlement communities have access to funds for housing rehab through their Community Development Block Grant.)

PROGRAM GUIDELINES AND PROCEDURES:

For eligible homeowners, the Central Illinois Land Bank Authority will assist in exterior repairs. This includes roofs, leaders, gutters, exterior siding, porches, and steps. Interior repairs are not allowed under this program. Although interior repairs may be of need for some families and households in Champaign County, we don't currently have the resources available to tackle possible lead and asbestos issues that would likely arise when doing interior work. Instead, we will work with households to do exterior work which will immediately change the look and value of the property and its block.

To be eligible for the Home Rehab Program, the owner must own and live in the property that will be renovated and their household income must be below 80% of the County's Income Limits (as determined by HUD). We will work with a qualified partner to do income verification of applicants.

When possible, to streamline the process of finding applicants and to the deepen impact of home repairs, we plan to partner with the local weatherization program to provide needed repairs that will increase the efficacy of weatherization efforts. Far too often, household applicants for weatherization programs are denied due to needed repairs to make the weatherization worthwhile. This is where CILBA will step in. Additionally, we can work within their pipeline of projects to identify other repair work that needs to be done on qualified homes even if the needed repair doesn't necessarily impact the efficacy of weatherization. For

example, a household looking for weatherization might receive repairing, caulking, and weather stripping of doors and windows. While the weatherization contractors are doing this work, they might notice that the roof and porch are in need of replacement. By notifying CILBA, we will be able to step in to provide these repairs allowing the household to not only live in a more energy efficient, healthy, and safe home but also improve the exterior of the home. This will increase its value and positively impacting the homeowners and the surrounding community. This collaboration is about deepening the impact of repair and weatherization, whatever form that might come in.

REQUEST:

We are requesting \$500,000 from Champaign County's American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) allocations. We are requesting similar funds from Vermilion County's ARPA funds, as our service area covers both counties. State and Local ARPA funds must be used to respond to or mitigate COVID-19 or its negative economic impacts; cover costs incurred as a result of the emergency; or replace revenue that was lost, delayed, or decreased as a result of the emergency.¹ Across the country, families, households, and individuals lost income, stability, and their health. Financial hardships caused by the COVID-19 pandemic hit low-income families especially hard due to widespread job loss and reduction in hours.² Opportunities for low-income households to save money has been especially difficult during the pandemic.³ This means there are fewer available dollars to low-income families to spend on things like home repairs. Homes with ignored, needed repairs can lead to significant health and social impacts for the household and neighbors. By investing in repairs for low-to-moderate income households, we are improving the health and social environment for the household and the community. Furthermore, by focusing on repairs we are working to preserve needed housing stock. Too often, without needed intervention, homes in need of repair will deteriorate further and inevitably result in disrepair and possibly necessary demolition. By intervening with necessary repairs, we play a role in stopping a cycle of deterioration and demolition that is all too familiar in Vermilion County.

This investment of ARPA funds from the County will help CILBA build a track record to apply for homeowner occupied rehab funding available through DCEO, IHDA and USDA. Outside of CILBA, there are no organizations serving LMI owner occupied households with these repair programs in small communities and rural areas – we believe this is a significant missed opportunity and an area in which we can provide significant benefit to the County and LMI households that need help.

Dear Ms. Kloeppe,

I have been a social worker in the Champaign Community for over 20 years and have witnessed the toll that violence has had not only on individuals and families, but the community as a whole. The impact of COVID-19 has contributed greatly to lack of resources and level of violence we are experiencing. Gun violence, in Champaign County has been slowly rising this past decade and then exploded during COVID-19. 2020 saw 266 shooting incidents; almost twice as many as in 2019. Gun violence disproportionately impacts communities of color and low income neighborhoods compounding the impact of historical and current racism.

As a proud board member, I am writing today to advocate that CU Trauma and Resiliency Initiative (CU-TRI) receives five to ten percent of the American Rescue Plan funding. Our city and county need a comprehensive and collaborative strategic plan that addresses the ROOT causes of violence as outlined by the CDC and includes the Social Determinants of Health.

CU-TRI's mission's statement is *to create equitable, just and loving communities in which every person is cared for, connected, supported, and well. We believe that this can be done through advocating for trauma informed, just, and equitable policies, practices, and procedures; in addition to providing communities with the knowledge and tools they need to understand trauma and resilience so they can respond to people's needs in a culturally response, strength-based, and trauma informed way.*

Violence prevention requires a holistic, trauma informed strategy. This is a public health and community development issue, not a law enforcement or crime issue. Currently, our cities and our county provides resources but these supports are not coordinated for effectiveness and are underfunded. Using the trauma informed core principles of Safety, Trustworthiness and Transparency, Peer Support and Mutual Self-Help, Collaboration and Mutuality, Empowerment, Voice, and Choice, and Cultural, Historical, and Gender Issues (Social Justice), CU-TRI can serve and reach even more individuals in our community.

This is a formal request for available funding to improve the infrastructure of the Pesotum Consolidated Drainage District. Our district is made up of approx.. 4000 acres in Pesotum Township located in southern Champaign County and provides drainage to the west side of the village of Pesotum. We currently have aging drainage tile that date back to the early 1900's when they were originally installed. The original tile is still working today but are undersized and our failing at an alarming rate. Each time these tiles fail, they created huge sinkholes in the earth, which creates safety concerns for our roads and our community and causes a financial drain on our resources as we repair these tiles.

Our request would be to relace 8,185 feet of tile starting at the open ditch and going to the I-57 interstate highway. The total cost estimate of this project would be \$362,967.61

Funding of this project would be a long-term investment in the infrastructure of Champaign County.



The Champaign Park District Board of Commissioners asked staff to reach out to the County Board to restate our request for funds to assist with the construction of the Martens Center. We truly believe this Center will change the lives of our residents.

Like most local agencies the Champaign Park District has lost over \$1.8 million in revenues during the past year due to the COVID-19 Pandemic. Despite this fact, the Park Board of Commissioners were still able to support the community in a variety of different ways during the past 18 months. The District was at the forefront of a variety of pandemic efforts specifically by opening its facilities to partner with those in need, such as CU at Home to provide socially distanced sleeping space for our community's most vulnerable individuals at the Douglass Community Center, the Public Health District as a vaccination center at the Douglass Community Center, the Champaign Police Department to provide office space at the Bresnan Meeting Center, and local restaurants by providing picnic tables and staff for the downtown picnic parks last summer.

At the same time, we pivoted to offer a variety of safe and innovative in-person and virtual programs for our residents. The Park District staff created and offered numerous programs to keep the youth in the community active and when possible, our facilities were open to provide activities. The Park District also expanded its capacity due to increased park because of the stay at home order and subsequent restrictions. It was clear, the residents needed the parks to walk, exercise, and reduce stress. The parks also provided playgrounds, tennis courts, pickleball courts, basketball courts, splash pads, and most importantly a safe place to walk or run on the path. Despite increased use, the Park District maintained clean and safe parks and amenities.

The Park District also made many significant financial investments to improve our parks and facilities and keep many staff and contractors employed during the past year with the following projects being completed or started during this period:

- Started the \$12 million dollars' worth of improvements to Human Kinetics Park and the new Martens Center on North Market Street.
- Improvements to Spalding Park.
- Improvements to Heritage Park.
- New sound system for the Virginia Theatre and we are starting on a new HVAC system at the theatre.
- Improvements to the old Leonhard Recreation to be a new safe space for Champaign-Urbana Special Recreation.



County Executive Kloeppele stated her belief that the appointments required board approval; Board Chair Patterson stated the task force is not a subcommittee of the County Board and as such will not necessitate the approval of the board. Board Member Fortado asked about a rural school's representative on the task force; Board Chair Patterson stated his intention to name a rural schools representative to the task force but has not yet selected a nominee; Board Member Harper stated he knows an interested rural schools individual and will pass the name on to Board Chair Patterson. Board Chair Patterson and Board Member Thorsland both stated opposition to the board approval of nominees as it would delay any future additions to the task force. Champaign County Mental Health Board Executive Director Lynn Canfield was invited to join the discussion; she stated that only the funds allocated to the Regional Planning Commission (RPC) could be returned immediately, the other allocations must be evaluated by an independent CPA at the end of 2022 and thus could not be returned until early 2023. Board Chair Patterson asked that the monies as of 06/30/2022 be returned at a later date. Board Member Straub spoke about community needs and resources, especially the First Followers program. Board Member Carter asked board members to visit the APRA funded non-profits to educate themselves on the work done and the community needs. Board Member Lokshin noted the mental health needs in the jail population. Board Member Carter asked when the surplus monies could be returned; Executive Director Canfield stated the RPC would be returned by September 2022 and the others by January 2023. Board Member Humphrey offered his apologies for remarks follow the failure of the resolutions at the June 2021 County Board meeting and offered his praise for the work done by the First Followers program. The final agreed upon amendment language stated: "All unused contract year 7/1/2021-6/30/2022 Mental Health Board (MHB) American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds, following reconciliation, will be returned to the county's ARPA fund." County Executive Kloeppe introduced Kathy Larson, RPC Economic Development Specialist, as the county ARPA Project Manager. Board Member Carter thanked Larson for her past work at RPC. Board Member Thorsland asked about Project Manager

Larson's availability to provide the board with project updates; County Executive Kloeppel stated that Project Manager Larson will be at the study sessions and present quarterly updates to the board.

Board Member Fortado began discussion on premium pay request from ARPA funds. Board Member Fortado noted the difficulty in premium pay dispersal, noting the Sheriff's Office's request for premium pay and signing bonuses, and she noted the ARPA text explicitly notes premium pay is allocated for those who conducted in-person work during the pandemic. Board Member Thorsland also spoke about the difficult choices, especially noting the risks of the Sheriff's Office's deputies and correctional staff; he stated a preference to make any premium pay decisions after the board gets the results of the workforce study. Board Member Passalacqua noted the premium pay is not a fix for salary inequality and stated a preference to evaluate the risks incurred by each department. Board Member Summers suggested the board view it as a bonus not pay. Board Chair Patterson praised the difficult work correctional officers have faced and continue to face with regards to the coronavirus, while also acknowledging the risks other departments have faced, especially the Clerk's Office staff with elections. Board Member Lokshin also praised the work of the Clerk's Office with elections, especially the 2020 March primary. Board Member Carter noted that all county workers assumed greater risks. Board Member Fortado noted that the premium pay should be done as a stipend for Human Resources payroll purposes, but a limited hourly bonus could be used for those who had more public interaction; she also noted the topic should be revisited in 2022 for those still working under covid protocols in 2021, and she also stated support for bonuses to all Sheriff's Office staff including those exceeding the salary threshold. Board Member Michaels asked to consult with county human resources about premium pay versus bonuses and asked for risk equity to be considered. Board Member Paul asked to address premium pay to be addressed after other county issues have been addressed and stated his belief that no government employees deserve any bonus pay considering the job losses suffered in the county. Board Member Humphrey noted that a bonus may help with retention issues in county staffing. County Executive Kloeppel notes the county staff deficit total is increasing. Board Member Lokshin asked how many employees are below the salary threshold; Board Member Fortado stated 291 (plus an additional 231 at RPC) are below the threshold and 109 (plus an additional 19 at RPC) exceed the threshold. County Executive Kloeppel stressed to the board a need to develop a decision process for ARPA fund distribution. Board Member Goss suggested addressing the Sheriff's Office deputies and correctional officers first.

Sheriff Heuerman was invited to join the discussion; he noted the damage to the sally port but emphasized that there was no breach of the jail and that officers performed admirably and in accordance with their training. Sheriff Heuerman highlighted Lieutenant Snyder's actions in response to the satellite jail attack.





The Physical Plant respectfully requests a FY2021 Budget Adjustment for \$7,500.00 for GHR Engineering to conduct a Video Surveillance Camera System and Master Control System study of the Sheriff's Office/Downtown Jail, Satellite Jail and Brookens Administrative Center.

Sheriff Heuerman has identified these issues to be of utmost priority and concern for these facilities. Updating the antiquated surveillance camera systems at the Sheriff's Office/Downtown Jail, Satellite Jail, and Brookens would provide necessary surveillance, both inside and out of these facilities. An updated video security system can provide greater awareness of facility security, as well as improving the overall safety and security for staff and inmates.

Modern camera systems today can have the ability to notify staff immediately of impending medical issues of inmates, so that this type of issue(s) can quickly be identified, and appropriate response(s) can be administered. Additionally, an updated camera system would have the ability to monitor social distancing, occupancy, and masking requirements, as well as identifying inmates and staff with abnormal body temperatures.

The Sheriff further requested updating of the Master Control Systems of the Downtown Jail and Satellite Jail. Both electronic door and communication systems are inadequate for today's jail operation. It has become more difficult to find outdated parts for repair of both systems. We are dangerously close not having a viable solution for repair of either system.

A GHR Study of this essential security equipment would provide the County with an exact project scope and associated construction projects estimates by system and by building. Further, GHR will provide us with a comprehensive report (scope and costs) and graphical representations of each system to better evaluate each project.

The FY2021 Self-Funded Insurance budget was prepared based on an actuarial study completed for the County. In recognition of potential settlement of claims against the former Champaign County Nursing Home, administration increased FY2021 appropriation above the actuarial recommended amounts. However, with the anticipated settlement of three large claims, appropriation is insufficient to cover the County's total financial obligation up to the stoploss amounts for each claim. Approval of this budget amendment will provide appropriation necessary within the Self-Funded Insurance budget for payment of the pending settlements.

With the reallocation of the former Nursing Home levy in FY2020, the Self-Funded Insurance fund balance is in a healthy position to sustain the financial impact of settling these claims.



Please find attached a resolution for your consideration to approve a sign-on incentive for new correctional officers in 2021.

We are currently experiencing critical levels of staffing in the jails. We have seen an increase in employee turnover in multiple divisions at the Sheriff's Office, but none as concerning as we are currently seeing in corrections. This turnover is due to multiple circumstances aggravated by COVID protocols, including current criminal justice climate, pay, seeking alternative employment goals, and mental/physical safety concerns (many of the inmates currently in the jails are accused of violent crimes and/or have mental health issues). Many of these things are out of our control.

It is projected that by the end of July, the corrections division will be short 10 correctional officers, the highest number of vacancies we have ever experienced. To help put things into perspective, that is one-fifth of our front-line correctional officers. Lieutenants, the Captain, and the Chief Deputy have all stepped in to help fill the void, however that cannot be maintained for very long.

We currently only have 2 correctional officer candidates on the eligibility list and are working to get them evaluated for open positions as soon as possible. The time from interviewing a candidate until a correctional officer is ready to work on his/her own is approximately five months, not including time at the training academy. Recruitment, training, and equipment also cost the county significant amounts of money.

Our staffing shortage has caused us to postpone crucial training for our officers, as well as postpone anticipated dates to get inmate programs up and running again after COVID-19. Overtime for officers is at an all-time high, resulting in increased stress, decreased mental health, and increased opportunity for mistakes to be made in operations – mistakes that could lead to lawsuits, or worse, injury to staff and inmates. We are at the point of exploring using other Sheriff's Office divisions, including the patrol division, to fulfill our legally obligated responsibilities of the corrections division. This, in turn, could jeopardize the work of the other divisions, potentially jeopardizing public safety in our county. We are left with few other options.

RECOMMENDATION:

My recommendation is for a \$5,000 sign-on incentive for new correctional officers, retroactive to January 1, 2021, and applicable only to those correctional officers still employed with the Sheriff's Office. 50% will be provided upon successful completion of field training and 50% after fulfilling their three-year contract with the Sheriff's Office. Anticipated total cost for this is \$75,000 (15 anticipated hires) - \$37,500

in FY2021 (50%) and \$37,500 (50% remainder after 3 years) in FY2024, but the amount may be higher or lower depending on the actual number of new hires.

If you notice, many businesses in the county, and the nation, are offering sign-on bonuses to try to recruit and retain quality employees. When some jobs may pay \$15/hour or more (e.g., Amazon's advertised starting pay) plus a sign-on bonus, it is difficult to find employees willing to make little more than that in a much more hostile and security/safety-driven environment. It costs tens of thousands of dollars in training, equipment, and manpower to get a new correctional officer ready to work independently. This sign-on bonus will help to not only recruit quality employees but also retain them.

I appreciate your consideration of this hiring incentive to help recruit and retain quality employees. If the board approves the resolution, I will then submit a budget amendment request to the Board.

RE: Coroner and Public Defender Budget Requests

Due to continuing county budget constraints, for several years the county has not been able to fund enough positions to keep up with increasing workloads in several departments, however increasing dependence on overtime for coverage of operations is also increasing annual staffing costs, and several departments are unable to accommodate the day to day demands of their workload anymore. During the budget discussions, additional staff positions were requested by several departments this year (and some carried forward from previous years).

These two requests from the Coroner and Public Defender were originally requested for the 2022 budget, however the workload created by the recent increase in gun violence and shooting deaths has pushed both offices over the limit of their capacity to a point that some immediate action is needed to increase staffing now. While in past these two departments have managed to accommodate temporary workload increases with overtime, they are now experiencing constant overtime demands which are taking a toll on staff retention and mental health.

I support approval of the Coroner's request for additional 2 staff and the Public Defender's request for 1 additional attorney at this time and accompanying budget appropriations to hire them as soon as possible rather than waiting for 2022.



Dear Ms. Fortado,

I have submitted Board Budget Amendment number 21-00052 requesting an increase of \$43,788 in the coroner regular full-time salaries line item for the remainder of fiscal year 2021. This increase would allow me to hire two additional full-time deputy coroners at a cost of \$27,456 to assist with the tremendous death investigation workload currently affecting the coroner's office. The coroner's office has experienced a more than 25% increase in the number scene responses since 2018. As of June 30, 2021, coroner staff handled 239 more calls than the first six months of 2020. Additionally, the coroner's office has experienced historical highs in the number of suicides, accidental overdoses, and homicides since 2018. The remaining \$16,332 is needed to cover benefit time payouts for three full-time staff who resigned since April 2021 and increases in current full-time staff wages to be competitive with similar positions in other jurisdictions. This budget amendment request includes an increase of \$7,825 in temporary wages for training part-time autopsy technicians who replaced previous staff who resigned to take full-time positions in other states. My final request in this budget amendment is for an increase of \$21,086 in the overtime line item to cover overtime costs for the remaining 8 holidays in FY21 and other overtime costs incurred while new staff hires are in training. I respectfully request the Finance Committee make a

recommendation to the Champaign County Board for approval of this fiscal year
2021 budget amendment.



Request for additional staffing

July 9, 2021

I am requesting the addition of four staff members. I am in need of one full-time legal secretary and three assistant public defenders. To meet the needs of our clients and ensure that we are effectively representing each and every client appointed to our office, we need another felony level attorney, one misdemeanor level attorney and an entry level attorney.

My office is in need of a legal secretary as my Executive Assistant is having to fulfill the role of a legal secretary as well as doing her job on nearly a daily basis. When one of my secretaries is out sick or on vacation my Executive Assistant has to step in and help the other secretary answer phones, help the clients who enter our office and complete filings as well as all the other secretarial duties and duties her own position requires her to complete. She often has to stay late in order to complete her own work. There are times when she is pulled away from her own duties to help when both secretaries are present because the volume is just too great for my two legal secretaries to handle.

As I am sure you are aware there has been an increase in gun crimes and other violent crimes in Champaign County. The murder rate has also risen. Almost every agency in our jurisdiction now uses body worn cameras to document their interaction with the public. Over the last several years there has been an increase in violent and gun related crime, an increase in digital evidence (body worn cameras, home surveillance systems, store surveillance systems, and everyone who records what they see in public) which has increased the amount of discovery my attorneys have to review in the course of representation of each client. For example, in a murder case we routinely have well over 60 pieces of digital evidence to review in addition to the standard police reports. In a normal shoplifting case there could be anywhere from 4 to 10 pieces of digital evidence to review in addition to the reports. Almost all interviews of victims, witnesses and the defendants are now recorded. Many are several minutes to hours long.

Many of the cases we are appointed to routinely take several hours to prepare for court and additional hours to prepare for motion hearings or trial. At the current staffing I have my attorneys struggle to review all the necessary digital and paper

evidence. My attorneys work nights and weekends putting in many hours over the 37.5 they are paid for each week to ensure that our clients receive the representation they deserve and as required by law. This can be and is very exhausting and stressful when we are understaffed.

Recently the Illinois Supreme Court enlisted the Sixth Amendment Center to study the Trial Level Indigent Defense Services in the State of Illinois. As expected, the Sixth Amendment Center determined that my office is woefully understaffed and that we routinely exceed the standard number of cases that we are recommended to handle. I have attached excerpts of this report to this letter.

I do not idly request an increase in 4 staff members and would not do so if I did not think it was imperative to the operation of my department and to adequately and zealously represent the clients we have been appointed to represent and are required by law to represent effectively.

I understand this will come at a cost to Champaign County and that there will be some building costs associated with this request as I do not have adequate space in my current office to house 3 more attorneys. The only way to add additional space to my office is to take part of the jury assembly room and renovate it into 3 to 4 offices. This will also make room for expansion of my office in the future if needed as I hope in the future to add a social worker to my staff as well.

Dear Ms. Kloeppe and Board Members:

It is my understanding that the Champaign County Public Defender has asked for additional staff. I am in full support of her request. I have reviewed Ms. Miller-Jones' letter dated July 9, 2021, and agree with her arguments. Being a former Chief Public Defender for almost two decades, I am well aware of how the office functions and what its needs are. As Ms. Miller-Jones has noted, there has been an increase in violent crime, cases are becoming much more complex with DNA and cases are more time-intensive because of reviewing bodycams and other evidence.

In 1973, the National Advisory Commission (NAC) established national standards for caseloads of attorneys appointed to represent indigent defendants as part of an initiative funded by the U.S. Department of Justice. The standards were not binding and have never been followed in Illinois and many other states. Those standards prescribe that a single attorney should not handle, in one year, more than a maximum number of cases. For example, the maximum limit for felonies is 150 per attorney per year. Please note that there is legislation on the Governor's desk, HB 2427, to create a Public Defender Task Force which, in part, may create standards for Illinois.

In June of this year, the Sixth Amendment Center (Center) provided a report to the Illinois Supreme Court. The Center is a non-partisan, non-profit organization providing technical assistance and evaluation services to policymakers and criminal justice stakeholders. The Illinois Supreme Court, through the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts, commissioned this evaluation. Champaign County was one of the subject counties it evaluated.

As to caseloads, the Center reported that, applying the NAC standards, the Champaign County Public Defender's Office should have 12 attorneys to handle felony matters alone. In fact, though, the entire office only has 14 attorneys to handle all cases – felony, misdemeanor, traffic, juvenile delinquency, juvenile abuse and neglect and mental health commitments. The Center reported that assistant public defenders spoke openly

about their fear of “burnout” from excessive caseloads. One attorney described having pretrial conferences scheduled with 50 clients at one court date and 100 more clients with pretrial conferences the very next day; the attorneys reported that there is often a line of up to 50 people waiting to speak with an attorney before court. Having been in that position, I can attest to the truth of those statements.

As the center noted, even in the simplest case, the attorney must, among other things:

- keep the client informed throughout the duration of proceedings;
- request and review discovery from the prosecution;
- independently investigate the facts of the case, interviewing both lay and expert witnesses;
- prepare appropriate pretrial motions and read and respond to the prosecution’s motions;
- prepare for and appear at necessary pretrial hearings, wherein he must preserve his client’s rights;
- negotiate plea options with the prosecution, including sentencing outcomes; and
- all the while prepare for the case to go to trial (because the decision about whether to plead or go to trial belongs to the client, not to the attorney).


I understand that there is a cost associated with additional staffing. I am also aware that there will be a cost to reconfigure the office space since the current physical space for the Public Defender’s Office is insufficient for any more staff. That cost is necessary for many reasons.

First, the Champaign County Public Defender falls under the authority of the judiciary. If the Court finds that they lack sufficient resources, the Court can appoint private counsel to handle matters. I hope that does not become routine. Recently, I received a bill from an attorney appointed on a murder case due to a conflict with the Public Defender. It has not gone to trial yet and the bill was for \$8,000. If the matter goes to trial, the bill could reach \$20,000+. That cost is for one lawyer for one case. Although the cost of a new assistant Public Defender would cost the county 2-3 times that amount, that same attorney could handle 150+ cases per year. This makes it cost-effective.

Second, I strongly believe that indigent persons, the court system and Champaign County will be better served with additional Public Defender staff, despite the cost increase. It is a necessary cost to ensure that the US and Illinois Constitutions are complied with and that indigent persons are provided sufficient resources to defend themselves.


