<u>Highlights</u>

During this reporting period, the ACCESS LECC spent most of her time providing technical assistance for the Illinois United for Youth State-Wide SOC SAMHSA Planning Grant and coordinating the relocation of the ACCESS Community Home Office.

The Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) and the Caring for Every Child's Mental Health Campaign Team announced winners for the **2013 Excellence in Community Communications and Outreach (ECCO) Recognition Program**. There were 79 entries submitted from 35 different System of Care communities. There were 24 finalists selected (Bronze, silver and gold recognition were given in each of the eight categories). **ACCESS Initiative received Bronze recognition in the Youth Outreach Category for our 2012 CMHAW Youth Awareness Show**. This is our second recognition. Last year we received Bronze recognition in the Media Outreach Category for our 2011 Website Launch Campaign.

ACCESS Community Home Office is now located at 502 W. Clark St in Champaign. We will be hosting a Fall ACCESS-ALL Update Meeting in November to showcase our new space and present national/local evaluation data.

The ACCESS LECC and Family Engagement Coordinator were selected to present a workshop at the 2013 National Federations Family Conference in November. The workshop will present participants with concrete steps for developing and implementing Faith-Based Peer-to-Peer Support Groups to address trauma, healing, and forgiveness.

Restorative Circles: A Different Way Through Conflict A Case Presentation

To be presented at the October 23, 2013 CCMHB Meeting 4:30pm (Brookens Administrative Center, Lyle Shields Room)

by UIUC Psychological Services Center and Conflict Clinic

The goal of the presentation is to illustrate how Systems of Care principles operate within a Restorative Circles intervention co-funded by the ACCESS Initiative and CCMHB.

A single "high stakes" case will be used to demonstrate the following Systems of Care and Restorative Circles principles:

- youth driven
- community owned
- trauma- and justice-informed
- empowering
- restorative
- **preventative** (of future violence)

In this case, there was reason to believe that a young man at the JDC, who **fatally shot another young man a year before**, was in danger of retaliation from the brothers, cousins and friends of the deceased man (upon his release). While the original death was tragic, there now seemed to be a risk of a continuing cycle of violence, incarceration and possible injury and death for the youth involved.

In this case, however, because all the youths had been part of the JDC Restorative Circles programming (one hour weekly restorative practices skill groups), they were familiar with the principles and options of restorative justice and all agreed to a Restorative Circle meeting to see if a non-violent solution could be found.

The case presentation will illustrate how using a set of Restorative Justice principles and Restorative Circles structures the youth were able to:

- listen to each other
- separate rumors from reality
- problem-solve together to figure out a different way forward for themselves
- ultimately create a non-violent solution to the problem
- involve others from the community in the solution

The case provides a compelling illustration of how one piece of restorative programming, supported by local funding, can potentially operate within a larger community wide effort to create change via Systems of Care principles.

Preface

Wilf Stevenson, Director, Smith Institute

The Smith Institute is an independent think tank which has been set up to undertake research and education in issues that flow from the changing relationship between social values and economic imperatives. In recent years the institute has centred its work on the policy implications arising from the interactions of equality, enterprise and equity.

In 2004-05 the Smith Institute ran a highly successful series of seminars looking at case studies of the use of restorative justice techniques among criminals and their victims, in schools and within communities and neighbourhoods. Building on the impressive accounts of how powerful restorative justice techniques could be, as a way both of changing behaviour and of mitigating harm, this independent report was commissioned by the Smith Institute in association with the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation in order to examine the evidence on restorative justice (RJ) from Britain and around the world.

The aim of the project was to bring together the results of RJ trials in order to set out a definitive statement of what constitutes good-quality RJ, as well as to draw conclusions both as to its effectiveness with particular reference to reoffending and as to the role that RJ might play in the future of Britain's youth and criminal justice systems.

Abstract

A review of research on restorative justice (RJ) in the UK and abroad shows that across 36 direct comparisons to conventional criminal justice (CJ), RJ has, in at least two tests each:

- substantially reduced repeat offending for some offenders, but not all;
- doubled (or more) the offences brought to justice as diversion from CJ;
- reduced crime victims' post-traumatic stress symptoms and related costs;
- provided both victims and offenders with more satisfaction with justice than CJ;
- reduced crime victims' desire for violent revenge against their offenders;
- reduced the costs of criminal justice, when used as diversion from CJ;
- reduced recidivism *more than* prison (adults) or *as well as* prison (youths).

These conclusions are based largely on two forms of restorative justice (RJ): face-to-face meetings among all parties connected to a crime, including victims, offenders, their families and friends, and court-ordered financial restitution. Most of the face-to-face evidence is based on consistent use of police officers trained in the same format for leading RJ discussions. These meetings have been tested in comparison with conventional criminal justice (CJ) without benefit of RJ, at several stages of CJ for violence and theft:

- as diversion from prosecution altogether (Australia and US);
- as a pre-sentencing, post-conviction add-on to the
- sentencing process;
- as a supplement to a community sentence (probation);
- as a preparation for release from long-term imprisonment to resettlement;
- as a form of final warning to young offenders.

Violent crimes

Six rigorous field tests found RJ reduced recidivism after adult or youth violence. Three of these were randomised controlled trials (RCTs), conducted with youth under 30 in Canberra, females under 18 in Northumbria, and (mostly) males under 14 in Indianapolis. Reasonable comparisons also show effects for adult males in West Yorkshire and the West Midlands, as well as for violent families in Canada.

Property crimes

Five tests of RJ have found reductions in recidivism after property crime. Four were RCTs done with youth: in Northumbria, Georgia, Washington and Indianapolis. Diversion of property offenders to RJ, however, increased arrest rates among a small sample of Aboriginals in Canberra.

Victim benefits

Two RCTs in London show that RJ reduces post-traumatic stress; in four RCTs RJ reduces desire for violent revenge; in four RCTs victims prefer RJ over CJ.

RJ versus prison

In Idaho an RCT of RJ as court-ordered restitution did no worse than short jail sentences for youth. In Canada adults diverted from prison to RJ had lower reconviction rates than a matched sample of inmates.

Offences brought to justice

Five RCTs in New York and Canberra show diversion to RJ yields OBTJ (offences brought to justice) rates 100% to 400% higher than CJ, including for robbery and assault, when offenders take responsibility but need not sign full admission to crime.

A way forward

The evidence on RJ is far more extensive, and positive, than it has been for many other policies that have been rolled out nationally. RJ is ready to be put to far broader use, perhaps under a "Restorative Justice Board" that would prime the pump and overcome procedural obstacles limiting victim access to RJ. Such a board could grow RJ rapidly as an evidence-based policy, testing the general deterrent impact of RJ on crime, and developing the potential benefits of "restorative communities" that try RJ first.

Foreword

Jerry Lee, President of the Jerry Lee Foundation

It is almost 10 years since the Attorney General of the US, Janet Reno, submitted an independent, scholarly report to the US Congress entitled *Preventing Crime: What Works, What Doesn't, What's Promising* (1997).² When I read that report shortly after it was published, I immediately sensed a sea change in the way democracies would talk about crime prevention. No longer would we focus just on ideology. Evidence would soon take a much larger role in the debate. Within a year, officials of at least 12 different nations would consider the report and its policy implications, from Seoul to Stockholm, from Wellington to London.

As a consumer of social science research in my business life for over four decades, I brought as sceptical an eye to that report as to any other. I came away extremely impressed with the rigour of the framework, its 1-to-5 scientific methods scale, and its comprehensive search for evidence on what works. The next day, I contacted the senior author of both that report and the current review of evidence on restorative justice, Lawrence Sherman.

Since then, the Jerry Lee Foundation has been pleased to support many reviews and evaluations of crime prevention programmes. By far the most comprehensive of these investments has been in the Jerry Lee Program of Randomized Controlled Trials in Restorative Justice, which began in 1995 with a multimilliondollar investment by the Australian government. With its expansion into the UK with funding from the Home Office in 2001, the programme has now completed 12 rigorous tests of restorative justice in a wide range of settings and populations. The programme's co-directors, Lawrence Sherman and Heather Strang, are also undertaking a wider review of the evidence on restorative justice for the International Campbell Collaboration, a peer-reviewed network for the systematic review of the effectiveness of public programmes.³ No one is better qualified than they are to prepare a crisp, readable assessment of the evidence on RJ.

The evidence clearly suggests that RJ is a promising strategy for addressing many of the current problems of the criminal justice system. More important, it is a strategy that has been subjected to rigorous testing, with more tests clearly implied by the results so far. The development of RJ in the UK over the past decade is a model in the evidence-based approach to innovations in public policy. Like the old story of the tortoise and the hare, the evidence on RJ cannot be gathered by rushing ahead. The evidence so far suggests that sure and steady wins the race.

The race for all of us is to reach a world of less crime and more justice. An endless increase in the prison population seems unlikely to achieve those goals. This report points out ways to bring more offences to justice, and perhaps reduce the cost of justice, while reducing the personal cost of crime to victims. No other policy I have seen would put the victim so clearly "at the centre" of a larger community in which we are all interdependent. How and when to use RJ most effectively is a matter that evidence can help decide. With this report, that evidence should now be more accessible to all.

Many people leading operating agencies in Australia, the UK and the US made possible the research summarised here. From the first RJ conference we saw in 1993, led by New South Wales Police Sergeant Terry O'Connell, to the early support of Metropolitan Police Commissioners John Stevens and Ian Blair in mid-2000, research and development in RJ has depended on innovative and visionary police professionals. These include Canberra Police Chief Peter Dawson of the Australian Federal Police, British Chief Constables Crispian Strachan, Peter Neyroud and Michael Craik, Chief Inspector Jane Simmons and Inspector Brian Dowling, and the many dedicated RJ facilitators they recruited and led. The judiciary provided equal support from Lord Chief Justice Woolf, Lord Justice John Kay, and Judges Shaun Lyons and Shirley Anwyl, who helped recruit many of their colleagues to the Crown Court experiments. Eithne Wallis and Ray Fishbourne led the National Probation Service in support of RJ tests across England, Phil Wheatley led HM Prison Service in its support of RJ under even the most demanding conditions, Lord Norman Warner and Professor Rod Morgan provided steadfast Youth Justice Board support, and Dru Sharpling led London's valiant test of conditional cautioning.

The Smith Institute's steering group for this report led by Sir Charles Pollard, with members Rob Allen, Professor Mike Hough and Peter Micklewright, provided clear and timely guidance. Professor Paul Wiles and his colleagues at the Research Development & Statistics Directorate provided invaluable advice and support at many stages of this work, as did Professor Joanna Shapland and her team at Sheffield, and Professor David Farrington and Loraine Gelsthorpe at Cambridge. Finally, the global evidence on RJ would not be where it is today without the normative and scientific scholarship of our very special colleague, Professor John Braithwaite.

Executive summary

Purpose and scope

This is a non-governmental assessment of the evidence on restorative justice in the UK and internationally, carried out by the Jerry Lee Center of Criminology at the University of Pennsylvania for the Smith Institute in London, with funding from the Esmée Fairbairn Foundation. The purpose of this review is to examine what constitutes good-quality restorative justice practice, and to reach conclusions on its effectiveness, with particular reference to reoffending.⁴

Varieties of restorative justice

The review employs a broad definition of restorative justice (RJ), including victim-offender mediation, indirect communication through third parties, and restitution or reparation payments ordered by courts or referral panels. Much of the available and reasonably unbiased evidence of RJ effects on repeat offending comes from tests of face-to-face conferences of victims, offenders and others affected by a crime, most of them organised and led by a police officer; other tests cited involve court-ordered restitution and direct or indirect mediation.

What we found

Repeat offending

The most important conclusion is that RJ works differently on different kinds of people. It can work very well as a general policy, if a growing body of evidence on "what works for whom" can become the basis for specifying when and when not to use it. As tables 1 to 3 show, rigorous tests of RJ in diverse samples have found substantial reductions in repeat offending for both violence and property crime. Other tests have failed to find such effects, but with different populations, interventions or comparisons. In one rare circumstance, a small sample of Aboriginals in Australia, an offer of face-to-face RJ (and its partial completion) appears to have caused higher rates of repeat offending than CJ. This very limited evidence of backfiring can be balanced against the potential RJ may have as a full or partial alternative to incarceration for young adult offenders, who had much lower two-year reconviction rates (11%) in one Canadian study (N = 138) than a matched sample (37% reconviction) who served their sentence in prison.

In general, *RJ* seems to reduce crime more effectively with more, rather than less, serious crimes. The results below (tables 1 to 3) suggest RJ works better with crimes involving personal victims than for crimes without them. They also suggest that it works with violent crimes more consistently than with property crimes, the latter having the only evidence of crime increases. These findings run counter to conventional wisdom, and could become the basis for substantial inroads in demarcating when it is "in the public interest" to seek RJ rather than CJ.

Victim effects

The evidence consistently suggests that victims benefit, on

average, from face-to-face RJ conferences. The evidence is less clear about other forms of RJ, with no unbiased estimates of the effects of indirect forms of RJ on victims. But when victims willingly meet offenders face to face, they obtain short-term benefits for their mental health by reduced post-traumatic stress symptoms (PTSS). This may, in turn, reduce their lifetime risks of coronary disease (which PTSS causes in military veterans), as well as reducing health costs paid by taxpayers.

Offences brought to justice

When RJ has been offered to arrestees before charging in New York and Canberra, RJ has always brought at least twice as many offences to justice – and up to four times as many. Whether such effects could be even greater with widespread take-up of RJ across a community is a major question to be answered.

A way forward

There is far more evidence on RJ, with more positive results, than there has been for most innovations in criminal justice that have ever been rolled out across the country. The evidence now seems more than adequate to support such a roll-out for RJ, especially if that is done on a continue-to-learn-as-you-go basis. Such an approach could be well supported by a "Restorative Justice Board" (RJB), modelled on the Youth Justice Board but on a smaller scale. An RJB could prime the pump for RJ, proposing new statutes and funding new solutions to the obstacles that now limit victim access to RJ. An RJB could monitor RJ practices, design tests of new RJ strategies, and continue to recommend systemic changes needed to make RJ as effective as possible. It could, in effect, take RJ from the drawing board to its widespread construction, while also remaining at the drawing board for on-going improvements in design based on new evidence.

How we found it

Searching for evidence

The search process for this review built on the literature search protocol approved by the International Campbell Collaboration for the authors' registered and on-going review of the effects of face-to-face restorative justice for personal victim crimes.⁵ The search has been expanded for this review to encompass other forms of restorative justice and other kinds of crimes.

The following search strategies were used to identify evaluations of the effectiveness of RJ at helping victims and reducing reoffending:

- searches of online databases;
- searches of online library catalogues;

- searches of existing reviews of the literature on the effectiveness of RJ;
- · searches of bibliographies of publications;
- examination of publications already in our possession;
- referrals by experts in the field.

Both published and unpublished reports were considered in these searches. The searches were international in scope, but were limited to studies written in English.

Weighing the evidence

For all questions of the causal effect of RJ on such outcomes as victim mental health and repeat offending, we restricted our review to reasonably unbiased estimates of the difference that RJ made in comparison to some form of CJ. We followed the methods used by the National Institute of Health and Clinical Excellence (NICE) to assess evidence on the effectiveness of medical treatments. These methods (NICE, 2006) require us to use the "PICO" principle (population, intervention, comparison and outcome), asking, with every study examined, for exactly what *population* the RJ *intervention*, in contrast to what *comparison group*, produced what *outcomes*.

In assessing the strength of the evidence in each study that offered a reasonably unbiased PICO analysis, we were able to apply the Home Office (2004) standards for reconviction studies. These standards are based in part on the Maryland scientific methods scale (Sherman et al, 1997), which set a minimum threshold of level 3 for the Maryland report to the US Congress, *Preventing Crime*. Level 3 requires that the outcomes of at least two relatively similar P and C (population and comparison) groups are compared with (P) and without (C) the intervention. This review adopts that threshold, so that all statements about what works to reduce repeat offending or improve victim outcomes are based on a comparison between reasonably similar cases receiving RJ or not receiving RJ. For questions of implementation and description, the report incorporates both qualitative and before/after quantitative research designs.

Studies selected

The search process and eligibility criteria resulted in the identification of 36 tests eligible for inclusion in our quantitative review of the impact of RJ. These consisted of 25 reasonably unbiased estimates of the impact of RJ on repeat offending, six reasonably unbiased estimates of the effects of RJ on victims, and five estimates of the effects of diversion from prosecution to RJ on offences brought to justice. These studies and point estimates are listed in tables 1 to 5 in the "Summary" section below.

Synthesising the evidence

As the NICE (2006) manual for developing guidelines for practice indicates, it is important to avoid over-mixing of results from substantially heterogeneous populations, interventions, comparisons or outcomes ("PICOs"). Equations that lump together studies into "meta-analyses" with great differences on these dimensions may yield an overall estimate of "effect", but remain unclear as to the effect of what variety of intervention on which outcome for which population. A more conservative approach is to limit combinations of studies into "average" effects only when they share similar "PICOs". Given the diverse nature of the studies identified for this review, it is usually necessary to treat each study as the only point estimate of its particular PICO characteristies.

The review makes cautious exceptions to that rule on a limited basis. We report the findings on repeat offending grouped separately by property and violent crime, so that the reader may look for patterns in relation to this basic distinction in the kind of harm (physical or non-violent) that offenders do to victims. What we do not do is "vote count" the studies, declaring a verdict about whether RJ "works" or does not "work", either in general or in relation to specific characteristics of populations or interventions. The reason for that rule is that the available tests are by no means a fair "vote" from all possible tests. We do total the numbers of findings in different directions within broad domains, but this is merely for the convenience of the reader, who will want to do it anyway. We provide it only to emphasise the caution that is needed in interpreting the numbers.

SUBJECT:	Draft Three-Year Plan 2013-2015 with FY 2014 Objectives

The current Three-Year Plan 2013-2015 enters its second year of implementation. The draft Plan with objectives for Fiscal Year 2014 is an extension of the prior fiscal year. While many objectives reflect on-going commitments, others have been revised or added to advance the goals of the Plan or respond to changes in the operating environment. Over the last year, mental health services for adults involved with the criminal justice system has become a topic of particular interest to the CCMHB, the County Board, criminal justice system stakeholders, and the community. The CCMHB has responded with additional investment in services for this population as well as sought to realign access to services. The continued effort is reflected in a new objective included in the draft plan. Then there is the decision by the State of Illinois to include Champaign County as one of four east central Illinois counties selected to participate in a pilot project and an objective is added to reflect a commitment to being a partner in that endeavor. Another change acknowledges the Illinois Employment First Act for persons with a developmental disability. And as an administrative function, there is an objective to investigate options for moving to a web-based fee for service billing system.

Three-Year Plan for FY 2013 - 2015 with One-Year Objectives for 2014

The goals listed are for the period of 2013 through 2015. Objectives are for the 2014 fiscal year. A draft of the Plan is attached with proposed new or modified objectives italicized and underlined while completed objectives are lined out.

Staff has had an opportunity to review the draft document and will hold further discussions. This will include consideration of comments received from interested parties. At the time the draft Plan was released to the Board, the document was disseminated for comment.

The updated Three Year Plan will be presented for approval at the November 20, 2013 Board meeting.

CHAMPAIGN COUNTY MENTAL HEALTH BOARD

WHEREAS, the Champaign County Mental Health Board has been established under Illinois Revised Statutes (405 ILCS – 20/Section 0.1 et. seq.) in order to "construct, repair, operate, maintain and regulate community mental health facilities to provide mental health services as defined by the local community mental health board, including services for the developmentally disabled and for the substance abuser, for residents (of Champaign County) and/or to contract therefore..."

WHEREAS, the Champaign County Mental Health Board is required by the Community Mental Health Act to prepare a one- and three-year plan for a program of community mental health services and facilities;

THEREFORE, the Champaign County Mental Health Board does hereby adopt the following Mission Statement and Statement of Purposes to guide the development of the mental health plan for Champaign County:

MISSION STATEMENT

The mission of the CCMHB is the promotion of a local system of services for the prevention and treatment of mental or emotional, intellectual or developmental, and substance abuse disorders, in accordance with the assessed priorities of the citizens of Champaign County.

STATEMENT OF PURPOSES

- 1. To plan, coordinate, evaluate and allocate funds for the comprehensive local system of mental health, intellectual disabilities and developmental disabilities, and substance abuse services for Champaign County.
- 2. To promote family-friendly community support networks for the at-risk, underserved and general populations of Champaign County.
- 3. To increase support for the local system of services from public and private sources.
- 4. To further develop the systematic exchange of information about local services and needs between the public/private service systems and the CCMHB.

In order to accomplish these purposes, the Champaign County Mental Health Board must collaborate with the public and private sectors in providing the resources necessary for the effective functioning of the community mental health system.

CHILDREN, ADOLESCENT, AND FAMILY FOCUSED PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

Goal #1: Identify children at-risk of developmental delay and intellectual disability <u>or</u> <u>developmental disability</u> and support early intervention services and family supports.

Objective #1: Support use of evidence based/informed models for provider programs serving families with children age birth to five, and require collaboration and coordination by providers to limit duplication of effort.

Objective #2: Participate in collaborative bodies such as the Champaign County Birth to Six Council whose mission focuses on serving families with young children.

Objective #3: Collaborate with the Champaign County Board for the Care and Treatment of Persons with a Developmental Disability on issues of mutual interest associated with early intervention services and programs.

<u>Objective #4: In consultation with the Champaign County Board for the Care</u> <u>and Treatment of Persons with a Developmental Disability continue</u> <u>realignment of CCMHB funding to support early intervention services for</u> <u>children with an intellectual disability or developmental disability or delay.</u>

Goal #2: Identify youth at risk of social, emotional, and/or behavioral health issues and, using evidence based/informed services, engage in a process of healing and positive development.

Objective #1: Continue development and implementation of the SAMHSA Children's Mental Health Initiative Cooperative Agreement for the ACCESS Initiative system of care delineated in the SAMHSA application, including cultural competence development and support, subject to post-award changes as determined by the Coordinating Council, principle investigators, project director, and ACCESS team and partners.

Objective #2: Begin <u>Continue</u> discussions with ACCESS Initiative partners whose systems benefit from the youth and family interventions delivered through the ACCESS Initiative system of care to identify innovative means for sustaining system change. <u>Enter into Intergovernmental Agreements with other</u> local government funders to support the Community Coalition and the Access Initiative System of Care

Objective #3: Support continued implementation of the Parenting with Love and Limits (PLL) program based on positive evaluation and feedback from community partners and stakeholders.

Objective #4: As practicable, leverage resources of juvenile justice system stakeholders and units of local government benefitting from the outcomes of youth and families engaged in PLL.

Objective #5: Maintain collaboration with juvenile justice system stakeholders on implementation and evaluation of the Quarter Cent for Public Safety Fund supported services and PLL and the integration of Quarter Cent funded services and PLL with the ACCESS Initiative. Objective #6: Monitor evaluation of the ACCESS Initiative through engagement with evaluators on progress, including interim outcomes of the local and national evaluation, and through participation in the ACCESS Evaluation Collaboration Team.

Goal #3: Support adults' and families' access to services and programs, including evidence based/informed behavioral health practices to increase positive outcomes for consumers.

Objective #1: Continue participation and support for Champaign County Specialty Courts serving persons with substance use disorders and/or mental health disorders.

Objective #2: Support a continuum of services for persons with a mental health, substance use disorder, *intellectual disability* and/or developmental disability in response to reduced state supported services.

Objective #3: Promote wellness for people with mental illnesses, substance use disorders, <u>intellectual disabilities</u>, and/or developmental disabilities to prevent and reduce early mortality as embodied in the "10x10 Wellness Campaign."

Objective #4: Encourage training of staff across the service spectrum on use of evidence based/informed practice and associated outcome measurement.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT & ADVOCACY

Goal #4: Address stigma associated with a person's or family members' mental illness, substance use disorder, *intellectual disability*, and/or developmental disability through broad based community education efforts to increase community acceptance and positive self-image.

Objective #1: Continue support for and involvement in the signature antistigma and community education events <u>disAbility Resource Expo: Reaching</u> <u>Out for Answers</u>, Roger Ebert's Film Festival, and the ACCESS Initiative Children's Mental Health Awareness Week.

Objective #2: Participate in other community based activities such as walks, forums, and presentations to raise awareness.

Goal #5: Stay abreast of emerging issues affecting the local systems of care and consumer access to services and be proactive through concerted advocacy efforts.

Objective #1: Monitor implementation of the Affordable Care Act <u>and the</u> <u>expansion of Medicaid</u> by the State of Illinois and advocate for increased service capacity sufficient to meet consumer demand through active participation in the Association of Community Mental Health Authorities of Illinois (ACMHAI) and other state and national associations.

Objective #2: Track state implementation of class action suit settlements involving persons with <u>intellectual disabilities or</u> developmental disabilities or mental illness, e.g. Ligas vs. Hamos Consent Decree and Williams vs. Quinn Consent Decree, and proposed closure of state facilities, and advocate for the

allocation of state resources sufficient to meet needs of clients returning to home communities.

<u>Objective #3: Monitor implementation of the Illinois Employment First Act</u> including any associated rulemaking.

Objective #4: Continue broad based advocacy efforts at the state and local levels to respond to continued reductions in state funding and increasing delays in payment for local community based mental health, substance use disorder, and *intellectual disability and* developmental disability services *and supports* and to the broader human services network under contract with the State of Illinois.

Objective #5: In collaboration with the United Way of Champaign County, monitor implementation of the regional 211 information and referral system and its impact on local utilization of funded information and referral services.

Objective #6: Assess impact on local systems of care for persons with mental illness, substance use disorder, *intellectual disabilities* and/or developmental disabilities of the State of Illinois and provider networks movement to a regional service delivery model.

Objective #7: Collaborate with the Illinois Department of Human Services and the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services to support and participate in the implementation of Medicaid managed care pilot projects. This would also include anticipated changes in the Early, Periodic, Screening, Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT) Medicaid program.

RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT & COLLABORATION

Goal #6: Increase investment in programs and services through promotion of collaborative and innovative approaches.

Objective #1: Through participation in the Association of Community Mental Health Authorities of Illinois (ACMHAI), seek input and feedback on innovative approaches for resource development or cost containment.

Objective #2: Partner with other local entities for a coordinated response to needs of at-risk populations.

Objective #3: Consider non-financial support to agencies to offset state funding reductions and control costs.

Objective #4: Support and assist with affiliations and mergers of providers as a means to streamline the delivery of services and enable administrative cost savings through economies of scale.

Objective #5: Encourage development of collaborative agreements between providers to increase or maintain access and coordination of services for consumers residing in Rantoul and rural Champaign County.

Goal #7: Sustain the collaborative working relationship with the Champaign County Board for Care and Treatment of Persons with a Developmental Disability (CCDDB).

Objective #1: Implement the Intergovernmental Agreement between CCMHB and CCDDB.

Objective #2: Coordinate integration, alignment, and allocation of resources with the CCDDB to ensure the efficacious use of resources within the *intellectual disability and* developmental disability service <u>and support</u> continuum.

Objective #3: Assess alternative service strategies that empower consumers and increase access to needed but underutilized services.

Goal #8: Reduce involvement of target populations in the criminal justice system.

Objective #1: Collaborate with juvenile justice system partners on implementation of services supported with Quarter Cent for Public Safety Fund, Board resources, and the ACCESS Initiative to reduce youth contact and involvement with the criminal justice system.

Objective #2: In collaboration with county government, the criminal justice system and community based behavioral health service providers, develop an efficacious system of care designed to divert people with behavioral health needs from incarceration in the County Jail, assure appropriate linkage to behavioral health services for people discharged from the jail, and provide intensive case management for people with frequent incarcerations.

Objective #2: Continue participation in the Champaign County Specialty Court Steering Committee and support for Champaign County Drug Court and <u>support restoration of the</u> Champaign County Mental Health Court.

Objective #3: Using established oversight committees, review performance and evaluation reports including data on recidivism.

Objective #4: Support continuation of Champaign County Drug Court services funded through the Department of Justice Bureau of Justice Assistance Enhancement Grant award and the pursuit of non-CCMHB funding to sustain the enhanced services.

ORGANIZATIONAL DEVELOPMENT, ADMINISTRATION, AND ACCOUNTABILITY

Goal #9: Set priorities for funding through an annual review and allocation process to ensure access to core mental health, substance use disorder, and developmental disability services by consumers.

Objective #1: Draft priorities based on current service needs and operating conditions including consideration of changes in state funding and payment practices, commitments to implementation of the ACCESS Initiative, and obligations established through Memoranda of Understanding and Intergovernmental Agreements.

Objective #2: Solicit input from the service network and community at large on proposed funding priorities prior to adoption.

Objective #3: Utilize a competitive application process to evaluate proposals in relation to annual priorities.

Goal #10: Maintain program and fiscal accountability of service providers and programs under contract with Board.

Objective #1: Evaluate program performance on a quarterly and annual basis.

Objective #2: Implement the Audit and Financial Accountability policy.

Objective #3: Maintain the on-line application and reporting system and provide enhancements as necessary. Investigate the possible options for developing a web based billing system to support fee-for-service contracts and improvement of accountability.

Objective #4: Evaluate provider administrative expenses and cost allocation plans to ensure maximum investment in consumer services.

Goal #11: Respond to State funding reductions for mental health, substance use disorder, *intellectual disability*, and developmental disability services <u>and supports</u> through administrative efficiencies at the Board level enabling maximum investment in community service grants and contracts.

Objective #1: Continue the administrative services agreement as defined in the Intergovernmental Agreement the Board and the Champaign County Board for the Care and Treatment of Persons with a Developmental Disability.

SUBJECT:	FY15 Allocation Priorities and Decision Support Criteria

In Illinois, we are currently in the midst of major changes in the delivery of supports and services for people with mental illnesses, substance use disorders, and intellectual disabilities and developmental disabilities. The changes are being brought about by the State's rebalancing efforts, lawsuits and consent decrees, national trends and paradigm shifts, new statutes, implementation of the Affordable Care Act, Medicaid expansion, and various managed care pilot projects including the Choices project in Champaign Vermilion, Ford and Iroquois Counties.

Of concern to community mental health authorities and county developmental disabilities boards is how the myriad of changes will effect established funding patterns, and exactly where do we fit in this brave new world? The State's shift away from General Revenue Funding (GRF) to Federal Financial Participation (FFP) will continue to redefine our funding parameters, and will also create additional stress on an already stressed system because of the inadequacy of Medicaid rates.

On the positive side (i.e., for 708 and 377 Boards), the changes cited above will actually open up tremendous opportunities for rethinking how we prioritize local dollars. Specifically, we can anticipate the State (and their managed care entities) will control costs by making adjustments in clinical eligibility requirements. It is reasonable to

predict that a significant cohort of people will be in need of services, but will not meet the clinical threshold necessary to receive services.

Lastly, even though we know radical changes are coming, we still don't know the details of how the State systems (e.g., Department of Human Services, Department of Healthcare and Family Services, and the Department of Children and Family Services) will be organized and how services will be operationalized. As they say, "the devil's in the details." So to the extent possible we will try to influence change, but I anticipate we will mostly be watching and positioning ourselves to respond to change in a way which best meets the needs of the people of Champaign County.

Statutory Authority

Funding policies of the Champaign County Mental Health Board (CCMHB) are predicated on the requirements of the Illinois Community Mental Health Act (405 ILCS 20 / Section 0.1 et.seq.). All funds shall be allocated within the intent of the controlling act as codified in the laws of the State of Illinois. The purpose of this memorandum is to recommend and confirm service and program priorities for the FY15 (July 1, 2014 through June 30, 2015) funding cycle. CCMHB Funding Guidelines require annual review and update of decision support criteria and priorities in advance of the funding cycle application process.

Expectations for Minimal Responsiveness

Applications that do not meet these thresholds are "non-responsive" and will be returned to the applicant. All agencies must be registered using the on-line system. The application(s) must be completed using the on-line system.

- 1. Eligible applicant based on the Organization Eligibility Questionnaire.
- 2. Compliance with the application deadline. Late applications will not be accepted.

3. Application must relate directly to mental health, substance abuse or developmental disabilities programs and services.

4. Application must be appropriate to this funding source and shall provide evidence that other funding sources are not available to support this program/service.

FY15 Decision Priorities and Decision Support Criteria

Priority #1 – Collaboration with the Champaign County Developmental Disabilities Board Full compliance with the terms and conditions of the Intergovernmental Agreement between the CCMHB and the Champaign County Developmental Disabilities Board (CCDDB). This agreement defines the FY15 allocation for developmental disabilities programs and services, as well as the expectation for integrated planning by the Boards.

Priortiy #2 – ACCESS Initiative Sustainability

The CCMHB has committed to sustaining our system-of-care after the term of the cooperative agreement with IDHS expires on September 30, 2015. A major component of this effort will be to continue our support and sponsorship of the Community Coalition with the City of Champaign and other units of local government. We envision the Community Coalition as the system-integrating and planning level of the system of care. In addition, the CCMHB plans to work with the Community Coalition, the Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family services, and Choices (the managed care company contracted for the pilot project in Champaign, Vermilion, Ford and Iroquois Counties to plan the "service level" for the system-of care and organize our resources to coordinate with other funders to enhance service capacity and efficacy. Full integration of these collaborations and programs will facilitate and improve system level policy and coordination, police-community relations, seamless service delivery, expansion of available matching funds, and sustainability of the system-of-care infrastructure (e.g., family and youth involvement, cultural competence, trauma informed, strength based, etc.).

Priority #3 – Behavioral Health Programs for Youth with Serious Emotional Disturbance. Alignment between Quarter Cent for Public Safety funding, CCMHB funding, and other federal, state and/or local funding streams to efficaciously address the needs of youth with SED by supporting the following services and supports:

(a) **Parenting with Love and Limits (PLL)** – Maintenance of Parenting with Love and Limits (PLL) as a means of assuring clinical efficacy and attainment of desired outcomes for ACCESS Initiative youth and families, as well as other youth involved in the juvenile justice system.

(b) **ACCESS Initiative** – In partnership with the Illinois Department of Human Services (IDHS), implementation of the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA) Children's Initiative (by subcontract from the IDHS). During FY15, the project will be entering its transition phase as it moves away from the funding provided through the Cooperative Agreement to the sustainability phase.

(c) **Quarter Cent for Public Safety** – Full compliance with the MOU and support of development of a system of care which includes integrated planning with PLL and ACCESS Initiative. For FY15, it is recommended that this funding be used exclusively to support the Youth Assessment Center operated by the Regional Planning Commission (CCRPC).

Priority #4 – Behavioral Health Services and Supports for Adults with a Behavioral Health and Criminal Justice Interface.

Continuation during FY15 of the reconfigured behavioral health system which was designed to assure appropriate linkage to behavioral health services following incarceration, deflection of people with serious behavioral health problems prior to incarceration, and improved coordination between community based service providers and the Champaign County Jail's behavioral health service provider for people during their incarceration.

Included as a component of this priority is our continued support of the specialty courts, related services, and supports. Full compliance with memoranda of understandings pertaining to specialty courts will be continued during FY15.

Priority #5 – Local Funder Collaboration on Special Initiatives

It is recommended we support local funder collaborations intended to expand the availability of psychiatric services in Champaign County and/or development of an emergency shelter for families facing homelessness. Expansion of psychiatric services could include supporting a partnership between community based behavioral health providers and the Federally Qualified Health Center (FQHC) in Champaign County. The only caveat to this item pertains to how the ACA and Medicaid expansion addresses this deficiency. The implementation of Medicaid managed care could conceivably address this issue. An emergency shelter for families was piloted in the community last winter and spring. The prospect exists for those involved with the pilot to lead an effort to establish a permanent facility. As part of any collaboration with other local funders on an emergency shelter for families, consideration would be given to providing support services at the shelter.

Priority #6 – Support and Compliance with all Memoranda of Understanding and Intergovernmental Agreements

It is recommended we support and comply with expectations associated with MOUs and IGAs (e.g., commitment to funding 2-1-1 services).

Overarching Decision Support Considerations

The FY15 CCMHB allocation process will require all applications to address the overarching criteria listed below. Assessment of all FY15 applications will focus on alignment with these overarching criteria.

1. **Underserved Populations -** Programs and services that promote access for underserved populations identified in the Surgeon General's Report on Mental Health: Culture, Race, and Ethnicity and the consultation with Carl Bell, M.D.

2. **Countywide Access -** Programs and services that promote county-wide access for all people in Champaign County. Zip code data is mandated.

3. **Budget and Program Connectedness -** Applications that clearly explain the relationship between budgeted costs and program components receive additional

consideration. "What is the Board buying?" is the salient question that must be answered in the proposal, and clarity is required.

4. **Realignment of Existing FY14 Contracts to Address Priorities** – The CCMHB reserves the right to reduce or eliminate incumbent programs and services in order to support the six FY15 priorities listed in this memorandum.

5. **Anti-Stigma Efforts** – Activities that support efforts to reduce stigma associated with mental health, substance use disorders, and intellectual disabilities/developmental disabilities by increasing community awareness and challenging negative attitudes and discriminatory practices.

Secondary Decision Support and Priority Criteria

The process items included in this section will be used as discriminating factors which influence final allocation decision recommendations. The CCMHB uses an on-line system for agencies interested in applying for funding. An agency must complete the one-time registration process including the Organization Eligibility Questionnaire before receiving access to the on-line application forms.

<u>Approach/Methods/Innovation</u>: Applications proposing evidence based or research based approaches, and in addition address fidelity to the specific model cited. Applications demonstrating creative and/or innovative approaches to meet defined community need will receive additional consideration.

<u>Staff Credentials</u>: Applications that address and highlight staff credentials and specialized training will receive additional consideration.

Process Considerations

The criteria described in this memorandum are to be used as guidance by the Board in assessing applications for CCMHB funding, however, it is not the sole consideration taken into account in finalizing funding decisions. Other considerations would include the judgment of the Board and its staff, opinion about the provider's ability to implement

the program and services proposed, the soundness of the proposed methodology, and the administrative and fiscal capacity of the agency. Further, to be eligible to receive CCMHB funds, applications must reflect the goals and objectives stated in the Three Year Plan as well as the operating principles and public policy positions taken by the Board. The final funding decisions rest with the CCMHB and their judgment concerning the most appropriate and efficacious use of available dollars based on assessment of community needs, equitable distribution across disability areas, and decision-support match up.

The CCMHB allocation of funding is a complex task predicated on multiple variables. It is important to remember that this allocation process is not a request for proposals (RFP). Applicants for funding are <u>not</u> responding to a common set of specifications, but rather are applying for funding to address a wide variety of mental health, developmental disability and substance abuse treatment needs in our community. In many respects our job is significantly more difficult than simply conducting an RFP. Based on past experience we can anticipate the nature and scope of applications will vary significantly and will include treatment, early intervention and prevention models. For these reasons, a numerical rating/selection methodology is not applicable and relevant to our particular circumstances. Our focus is on what constitutes a best value to our community based on a combination of cost and non-cost factors, and will reflect an integrated assessment of the relative merits of applications using criteria and priorities approved by the CCMHB.

Caveats and Application Process Requirements:

- Submission of an application does not commit the CCMHB to award a contract or to pay any costs incurred in the preparation of an application or to pay for any other costs incurred prior to the execution of a formal contract.
- Technical assistance available to applicants will be limited to process questions concerning the use of the on-line registration and application system, application forms, budget forms, application instructions and CCMHB Funding Guidelines.

- Applications which include excessive information beyond the scope of the application format will not be reviewed and at the discretion of staff may be disqualified from consideration. Letters of support for applications are discouraged and if submitted will not be considered as part of the allocation and selection process.
- The CCMHB and CCDDB retains the right to accept or reject any or all applications, and reserves the right to refrain from making an award when it is deemed to be in the best interests of the county.
- The CCMHB reserves the right to vary the provisions set forth herein at any time prior to the execution of a contract where the CCMHB deems such variances to be in the best interest of Champaign County.
- Applications and submissions become the property of the CCMHB and as such, are public documents that may be copied and made available upon request after allocation decisions have been made. Materials submitted will not be returned or deleted from the on-line system.
- The CCMHB reserves the right, but is under no obligation, to negotiate an extension of any contract funded under this allocation process for up to a period not to exceed two years with or without additional procurement.
- If selected for contract negotiations, the applicant may be required to prepare and submit additional information prior to final contract execution, in order to reach terms for the provision of services that are agreeable to both parties.
 Failure to submit required information may result in cancellation of the award of a contract.
- The execution of financial contracts resultant of this application process is dependent upon the availability of adequate funds and the needs of Champaign County.
- The CCMHB reserves the right to further define and add additional application components as needed. Applicants selected as responsive to the intent of this on-line application process will be given equal opportunity to update proposals for the newly identified components.

- All proposals considered must be received on time and must be responsive to the application instructions. The CCMHB is not responsible for lateness or nondelivery of mail or messenger. Late applications shall be rejected.
- The contents of a successful application will be developed into a formal contract, if selected for funding. Failure of the applicant to accept these obligations can result in cancellation of the award for contract. The CCMHB reserves the right to withdraw or reduce the amount of an award if there is misrepresentation of the applicant's ability to perform as stated in the application.
- The CCMHB reserves the right to negotiate the final terms (i.e., best and final offer) of any or all contracts with the applicant selected and any such terms negotiated as a result of this application process may be renegotiated and/or amended in order to meet the needs of Champaign County. The CCMHB also reserves the right to require the submission of any revision to the application, which results from negotiations conducted.
- The CCMHB reserves the right to contact any individual, agency or employer listed in the application or to contact others who may have experience and/or knowledge of the applicant's relevant performance and/or qualifications.
- Final Decision Authority The CCMHB will make the final decision concerning all applications for funding, taking into consideration staff recommendations, defined decision support criteria, best value, availability of funds and equitable distribution of funds between disability areas.
