29 Wysocki called the meeting to order at 6:01 p.m.
30

31 **ROLL CALL**
32

33 Bork called the roll. Beckett, Bensyl, Betz, Cowart, Doenitz, James, Jay, Jones, Knott,
34 Kurtz, Langenheim, McGinty, Michaels, Nudo, Richards, Rosales, Sapp, Weibel, and Wysocki
35 were present at the time of roll call, establishing the presence of a quorum.

37 **APPROVAL OF MINUTES**
38

39 **MOTION** by Betz to approve the Committee of the Whole minutes of September 7, 2010;
40 seconded by Kurtz. **Motion carried with unanimous support.**
41

42 **APPROVAL OF AGENDA/ADDENDA**
43

44 **MOTION** by Rosales to approve the agenda; seconded by Langenheim.
45

46 Beckett asked about the resolution to meet as a Committee of the Whole that was not on the
47 agenda. Busey confirmed the resolution is no longer needed to be approved at every meeting due to
48 the changes to the County Board Rules approved last month.

49
50 O'Connor entered the meeting at 6:04 p.m.

51
52 Wysocki announced item 7.E.1 under Environment & Land Use was removed from the
53 agenda.

54
55 **Motion carried as amended with unanimous support.**

56
57 **PUBLIC PARTICIPATION**

58
59 Lisa Feig stated representatives from Triad Shredding were present if there were any
60 questions about the Zoning Case 671-AM-10. After confirming no one else wished to speak,
61 Wysocki declared public participation closed.

62
63 **COMMUNICATIONS**

64
65 Weibel announced that he received Sam Smucker's resignation from the County Board
66 today. A copy of Smucker's email was distributed to the Board members. Weibel stated he had
67 also been contacted by Matt Gladney, who was not able to attend tonight's meeting due to illness.

68
69 **ENVIRONMENT & LAND USE**

70 **Recreation & Entertainment License**

71 **Egyptian Collectors Association, Inc., Champaign County Fairgrounds**

72
73 **MOTION** by Jones to approve a recreation and entertainment license for Egyptian
74 Collectors Association, Inc., Champaign County Fairgrounds, 902-1302 North Coler Avenue,
75 Urbana, October 16 -17, 2010; seconded by James. **Motion carried with unanimous support.**

76
77 **Zoning Case 671-AM-10**

78
79 **MOTION** by James to approve Zoning Case 671-AM-10 and amend the Zoning Map to
80 change the district designation from the AG-2 Agriculture Zoning District to the B-4 General
81 Business Zoning District to allow Triad Shredding to construct a new facility as requested in related
82 Zoning Case 672-S-10; seconded by Jones. **Motion carried with unanimous support.**

83
84 **Draft Habitability Ordinance**

85
86 **MOTION** by Betz to approve the Habitability Ordinance; seconded by Langenheim.

87
88 James wanted to know if life safety issues reported to the Planning & Zoning Office would
89 be addressed. Hall answered that those issues would receive the highest priority with the recently
90 approved Nuisance Ordinance.

91

92 **Motion carried.**

94 **Rural Public Transportation**

95 Board Resolution Authorizing Application for Public Transportation Financial Assistance

96

97 **MOTION** by Betz to approve the Resolution Authorizing the Application for Public
98 Transportation Financial Assistance; seconded by Kurtz.

99

100 James asked how much liability the County would be held to if things fall apart and the
101 grant money does not come through for the rural transit system. Amy Marchant, the CRIS Rural
102 Transit CEO, verified that CRIS takes responsibility and has taken out a \$600,000 line of credit
103 specifically for this program. She was confident because CRIS has years of experience with this
104 exact type of project. James asked if the Board could opt out of the project if costs come back to
105 the County. Marchant answered that they absolutely could opt out.

106

107 Moser entered the meeting at 6:10 p.m.

108

109 James assumed that CRIS would be employing union labor and asked what would occur if
110 the programs ends before the labor contract has expired. Marchant stated no union was involved in
111 this program. The County Board is also being asked to approve a special warranty. Expenses are
112 allocated from Illinois Department of Transportation funding. Acceptance of the grant serves as an
113 assurance of funding for 60 days. Termination would require notification. James thanked Marchant
114 for the information.

115

116 **Motion carried.**

118 Acceptance of Special Warranty for Application to the Small Urban & Rural Program

120 **MOTION** by Weibel to approve the Special Warranty for Application to the Small Urban &
121 Rural Program; seconded by Betz. **Motion carried.**

123 IDOT & FTA Assistance Programs Joint Certifications & Assurances for Grantees

125 **MOTION** by James to approve the IDOT & FTA Assistance Programs Joint Certifications
126 & Assurances for Grantees; seconded by Weibel. **Motion carried.**

127

128 Ordinance to Provide Public Transportation

129

130 **MOTION** by Langenheim to approve the Ordinance to Provide Public Transportation;
131 seconded by Richards.

132

133 Langenheim requested a roll call vote.

134

135 **Motion carried with a vote of 17 to 4.** Beckett, Bensyl, Betz, Cowart, James, Knott, Kurtz,
136 Langenheim, McGinty, Michaels, Nudo, O'Connor, Richards, Rosales, Sapp, Weibel, and Wysocki
137 voted in favor of the motion. Doenitz, Jay, Jones, and Moser voted against the motion.

138 Intergovernmental Agreement between CRIS Rural Mass Transit District & Champaign County

139
140 **MOTION** by Betz to approve the Intergovernmental Agreement between CRIS Rural Mass
141 Transit District and Champaign County; seconded by James. **Motion carried.**

142
143 Bylaws of the Champaign County Rural Transit Advisory Group

144
145 **MOTION** by James to approve the Bylaws of the Champaign County Rural Transit
146 Advisory Group; seconded by Rosales. **Motion carried with unanimous support.**

147
148 Direction to Zoning Administrator Regarding Proposed Zoning Ordinance Text Amendments

149 Request to Amend the Champaign County Zoning Ordinance to Implement Land Resource
150 Management Policies 4.1.5, 4.1.7, and 4.1.9 as part of the FY2010 RPC Planning Contract

151
152 This item was moved to a study session in January.

153
154 Request to Amend the Champaign County Zoning Ordinance to Implement Land Resource
155 Management Policies 4.1.6 and 4.3.1-4.3.4 as part of the FY2010 RPC Planning Contract

156
157 **MOTION** by Kurtz to amend the Champaign County Zoning Ordinance to Implement Land
158 Resource Management Policies 4.1.6 and 4.3.1-4.3.4 as part of the FY2010 RPC Planning Contract;
159 seconded by Rosales.

160
161 Nudo asked to look at the amendments in great depth at a joint study session with the
162 Zoning Board of Appeals. He wanted the use of study sessions to become the regular way of
163 looking at Land Resource Management Plan items. It would be separate from the Committee of the
164 Whole meetings. This would allow the Board to have sufficient time to review the volume of
165 documentation and have the planners make presentations on these requests. He suggested the Board
166 start scheduling study sessions in November or after the new County Board term had begun.

167
168 The Board discussed the proposal to hold study sessions. Weibel said that study sessions
169 would cost the County more money by paying additional per diems to Board members when some
170 LRMP items may not take extra time. In answer to his question about the expense, Busey stated
171 each meeting of the County Board costs \$1,215 in per diems. The figure does not include the
172 amount paid to Board members for mileage. James suggested that some farmland issues should
173 wait until after the election. Kurtz asked Hall to provide a quick overview on the requested
174 amendments. Hall explained this is a mundane item to add new things to the Zoning Ordinance.
175 He appreciated that any Zoning Ordinance amendment can be complicated due to the complexity of
176 the ordinance itself. Discussion continued about the Zoning Ordinance.

177
178 **MOTION** by Nudo for this item and all LRMP provisions be placed to go to special study
179 sessions with the Zoning Board of Appeals; seconded by Doenitz.

180
181 Wysocki asked if Nudo's motion was intended to defer the agenda item. Nudo answered it
182 was not a deferral, but a motion to place any such items on a special study session agenda in the
183 future. Beckett called for a point of order because the motion constituted a deferral. He would not

184 support the motion as phrased because any matter involving the LRMP would have to go to a study
185 session. He felt the motion was much too broad. Whether an issue's complexity warrants a study
186 session should be considered on a per item basis. Betz agreed with Beckett that a study session
187 should be held for issues of great substance, but not for every LRMP related matter.
188

189 Wysocki inquired about what was being requested with this agenda item. Hall clarified the
190 amendment adds the limit on best prime farmland for rural residential overlays. He has tried to
191 fashion this in language that could go straight to the ZBA. The amendment also incorporates
192 specific policies about best prime farmland and site improvement into the required special use
193 permit findings. This is language the County Board has dealt with many times, but it has never
194 found its way into the ordinance. The amendment adds a condition about finding that public
195 services and infrastructure are adequate to support the proposed special use. Hall believed these
196 changes are non-controversial and common everyday concerns of the Board. The following text
197 amendment is more complicated, although it really just adds a special use permit to the rural
198 residential overlay. The standard conditions that are proposed are the kind of things that merit a
199 study session. He supported sending the third item to a study session in part. This County Board
200 has never seen the findings for a special use permit and the proposal is to change from six to nine.
201 Hall stated the amendment has a direct line back to the policies and it should be easy to prove. The
202 Board discussed the complexity of Environment & Land Use items.
203

204 James requested a friendly amendment to Nudo's motion that LRMP items be moved to a
205 study session at the discretion of the County Board, but that straightforward LRMP items are voted
206 on at the Committee of the Whole meeting.
207

208 **MOTION** by Beckett for a substitute motion to refer agenda items 7.E.2 &3 to a special
209 study session in January; seconded by Knott.
210

211 Beckett supported not holding routine study sessions, but to hold such sessions as necessary
212 depending on specific issues. He thought Nudo was making a County Board Rules change with his
213 motion. James concurred with Beckett's motion and dropped his request for a friendly amendment.
214

215 Wysocki requested a friendly amendment to expand Beckett's motion to include moving
216 agenda item 7.E.1 to a January study session. **Knott and Beckett agreed to accept the friendly
217 amendment.**
218

219 The Board further discussed holding study sessions for Environment & Land Use items.
220 Nudo and Doenitz agreed to accept Beckett's substitute motion as the motion on the floor.
221

222 **Motion carried to move agenda items 7.E.1-3 to a study session in January 2011.**
223 Request to Amend the Champaign County Zoning Ordinance to Implement Land Resource
224 Management Objective 4.4 as Part of the FY2010 RPC Planning Contract
225

226 This item was moved to a study session in January.
227
228
229

230 **Changing the Zoning Ordinance Requirements for Coal Mining**

231
232 Wysocki referred to Hall's memo in the agenda packet stating there is no county jurisdiction
233 over surface mining, including underground coal mining according to an Attorney General opinion.
234 Kurtz wanted the County Board Chair to request an updated opinion from the Attorney General
235 because the opinion was fifteen years old. He inquired if the Board Chair had requested such an
236 opinion from the Attorney General or State's Attorney.

237
238 Weibel exited the meeting at 6:40 p.m.

239
240 Beckett noted that such a request would require County Board action. Moser claimed that
241 all the potential coal mining would occur in District 4 and none of the landowners have complained.
242 The County should not develop a resolution to control coal mining in a township when so much is
243 still unknown about the situation. Moser said owners of valuable farmland do not need another
244 thorn in their sides regarding how they can sell their mineral rights. He urged the County Board to
245 keep out of this issue.

246
247 Kurtz understood Moser's concern for his constituents, but the Board members represent the
248 entire county, not just their individual districts. He has research about how coal mining poisons
249 water and no response has been sent by the mining company about where they will obtain sufficient
250 quantities of water to clean the coal. He wanted to get a new opinion from the Attorney General.

251
252 Regarding the water supply, Moser pointed out that the nearest town of St Joseph does not
253 get its water from the Mahomet Aquifer. He was tired of the Board meddling with a few property
254 owners in a corner of Champaign County and stated that counties do not regulate coal mining in
255 Illinois.

260 monthly report; seconded by Rosales. **Motion carried with unanimous support.**

278 Project Update

279

280 **MOTION** by Jay to receive and place on file the project update; seconded by Kurtz.

281 **Motion carried with unanimous support.**

282

283 **Facilities Director**

284 Physical Plant Monthly Reports

285

286 Reinhart stated the County has received the first month's billing for the Integrys Gas
287 contract. He did not anticipate seeing any immediate changes on the natural gas pricing. He hoped
288 the County would see substantial savings as the heating season progresses.

289

290 **MOTION** by Betz to receive and place on file the Physical Plant August 2010 monthly
291 reports; seconded by Rosales. **Motion carried with unanimous support.**

292

293 Update – RFP 2010-005 for Design Build of Coroner/Physical Plant Maintenance/County Storage
294 Facility

295

296 Reinhart noted that today was the final day for answering all questions for the second
297 addendum to RFP 2010-005. The bid opening is anticipated for next Tuesday. James asked how
298 many firms would bid on the project. Reinhart stated the addendum was sent to eight firms.

299

300 Update – ILEAS Roof Project

301

302 Reinhart explained the ILEAS Roof Project was out on the street for bids. The pre-bid
303 meeting will be held next Tuesday. The bid opening will be held on October 19, 2010. James saw
304 the advertisement in the newspaper and asked if any consideration was given to changing to the new
305 style of metal roofs instead of using regular shingles. Reinhart said it was too expensive for the
306 County's budget at this time.

307

308 Update – Energy Efficiency & Conservation Block Grant – Brookens Building

309

310 Physical Plant received the packet from the Regional Planning Commission and the Energy
311 Efficiency Conservation Block Grant of over \$60,000 was awarded. It will take Physical Plant time
312 to be ready to undertake the de-lamping and changing light fixtures in the Brookens Administrative
313 Center. Occupancy sensors and timers will also be installed. This project will take until March to
314 complete.

315

316 **Chair's Report**

317 Update – ILEAS Activity – Presented by Jim Page

318

319 Beckett explained that Jim Page was in attendance to provide an update on the ILEAS
320 activities at the old Nursing Home site. Page introduced himself to the newer Board members and
321 stated the Illinois Law Enforcement Alarm System (ILEAS) had leased the building for three years.

322 He thanked Beckett, Busey, the County staff, and the County Board for taking a leap of faith on
323 ILEAS. He spoke about the positive working relationship between the County and ILEAS staff.
324 ILEAS's growth has been dramatic and they presently have 70 full-time and part-time employees
325 throughout the state and at the facility. Over 10,000 people have gone through 400 different
326 training events at the facility since June 2008. These events bring in people from all over the
327 Midwest. ILEAS's volume of participants has increased every year. Page stated ILEAS now
328 manages Law Enforcement Grants for local law enforcement agencies in Illinois, the Illinois
329 Emergency Management Grants, the Public Works and County Highway Homeland Security Grants
330 for the State of Illinois, and the Illinois Medical Emergency Response Grant for the State of Illinois.
331 They have processed over \$100 million in homeland security grants. As state government is
332 collapsing in its capacity to manage grants, ILEAS has grown to fill that void because it is easier to
333 contract with an agency than to hire staff. Page said the partnership timing with the County Board
334 had been phenomenal.

335
336 There are 14 agencies that either sublease or have subscriptions to meeting space or storage
337 at the ILEAS facility. This has been a great way to offset costs for ILEAS. Page wanted the
338 County Board to know that ILEAS has paid local governments and businesses \$4.5 million for
339 various services since June 2008. A recent survey of 600 attendees determined over \$438,000 has
340 been spent on gas, restaurants, and shopping in the area when attendees travel to ILEAS from out of
341 town. The total impact of ILEAS on Champaign County's economy since June 2008 is valued at
342 approximately \$7.25 million.

343
344 In looking towards the future, Page shared that ILEAS has engaged an architect and
345 mechanical engineers to research the amount of work it would take to finish remodeling the
346 facility's 1971 addition. The main S wing, the service support wing, and the A wing have been
347 remodeled. The B and C wings have been left alone. ILEAS's growth is such that they now need
348 the space of the B and C wings. Page is looking into a possible \$400,000 grant to get a new
349 generator system and electrical upgrades to the building. He is putting the finishing touches on an
350 agreement with Carle Hospital to turn the entire C wing into a medical simulation learning lab.
351 This could be a regional asset for East Central Illinois medical facilities, if it goes forward as
352 planned. Page remarked that ILEAS has recently formed a 501c3 foundation to promote law
353 enforcement education training and provide equipment to law enforcement agencies that grants will
354 not cover. Page reiterated that ILEAS has had a great partnership with Champaign County. ILEAS
355 will have paid \$3.9 million to the County, including the lease amendment being considered tonight.
356 He thanked Reinhart, Busey, and County staff for their assistance and support.

357
358 Sapp thanked Page for his report and spoke highly of ILEAS's activities. He would love for
359 the County Board to take a tour of the ILEAS Facility. Page welcomed the idea and invited anyone
360 to contact him for a tour at anytime. Sapp commented on the amount of resources ILEAS has with
361 the vehicles available for deployment in the parking lot. Page explained a lot of steel gray trailers
362 and trucks in the parking lot belong to the Illinois Medical Emergency Response Team. The team
363 has 800 volunteers around the state, five staff people, and a portable hospital that can be taken
364 anywhere in the state to set up a field hospital. The parking lot also contains incident management
365 trailers and armored vehicles. Page said there were 6,000 radiation detectors in the facility that will
366 be sent to fire departments and law enforcement agencies throughout Illinois.

367

368 Knott considered the ILEAS lease for the previous Nursing Home facility as one of the most
369 positive actions taken by the County Board. He asked Page what the future of homeland security
370 funding looked like at the federal level. Page replied that a lot is unknown. He just finished sitting
371 on a FEMA taskforce to advise the Secretary of Homeland Security and the White House about
372 what is needed. Homeland security funding began with terrorism and was turned into all hazards
373 with the post-Katrina Hurricane Emergency Management Act. Page thought the homeland security
374 funding would remain pretty stable because, at \$900 million, it is a minuscule slice of the federal
375 budget. Some states like Arizona, Texas, and California receive more funding than other states.
376 ILEAS is fortunate because its model and operating system are designed for agencies to work
377 together and share resources.

378
379 McGinty spoke about how impressive and supportive the ILEAS Board is to Page and how
380 this lends itself to future successes. He was very pleased about the ILEAS facility.

381
382 Ammons entered the meeting at 6:58 p.m.

383
384 Becket thanked Page for the presentation.

385
386 **County Administrator**
387 **Amendment to Lease for Regional Law Enforcement Training Center between Champaign County**
388 **& ILEAS**
389

390 **MOTION** by Cowart to approve the Amendment to the Lease for the Regional Law
391 Enforcement Training Center between Champaign County and ILEAS; seconded by Kurtz.

392
393 Busey explained that Page asked to extend the lease for another year, effectively through
394 FY2013. The amendment terms are identical to the current lease. There will be no increase in the
395 rent payment, but the rent was increased substantially last year for the FY2012 lease. The County
396 receives the rent payment in advance. Busey pointed out a minor error in the amendment. Section
397 1.E should list the rent as being fully paid by November 30, 2010.

398
399 McGinty indicated that he and Sapp would have to abstain because their employer is
400 involved with the business at ILEAS. Beckett said they would not need to abstain because if Carle
401 Hospital becomes involved with ILEAS, it would be as a sublessee. The relationship between the
402 County and ILEAS is separate from a potential relationship between Carle Hospital and ILEAS.
403 McGinty and Sapp agreed to participate in the vote.

404
405 James asked for an estimated cost for the County to provide ILEAS with hardwired access to
406 the Champaign County fiber network and completion of a redundant fiber loop described in the
407 amendment terms. Busey said the cost was included in the total project costs for the new building.
408 Reinhart explained there will be three different links of hardwiring to complete the loop. He did not
409 remember the exact cost for the link with the ILEAS facility, but there will be other links. The total
410 fiber cost to link three buildings was less than \$20,000. ILEAS is one of those three buildings.
411 Busey said the budget for the new building would include the costs of cleaning up and finishing
412 some East Campus issues. The Board will see the budget for this project before the County moves
413 forward with it. Page added that ILEAS was in the process of installing a fiber line to bypass the

414 County's loop in order to prevent any negative impact on the County's network traffic as the ILEAS
415 IT processing grows.

416

417 **Motion carried with unanimous support.**

418

419 Closed Session Pursuant to 5 ILCS 120/2(c)6 to Discuss the Setting of Price for Sale or Lease of
420 Property Owned by Champaign County

421

422 **MOTION** by Rosales to enter into a closed session pursuant to 5 ILCS 120/2(c)6 to discuss
423 the setting of price for sale or lease of property owned by Champaign County. He further moved
424 the following individuals remain present: the Recording Secretary, County Administrator, and
425 Facilities Director. The motion was seconded by Kurtz. **Motion carried with a vote of 21 to 0.**
426 Ammons, Beckett, Bensyl, Betz, Cowart, Doenitz, James, Jay, Jones, Knott, Kurtz, Langenheim,
427 McGinty, Michaels, Moser, Nudo, O'Connor, Richards, Rosales, Sapp, and Wysocki voted in favor
428 of the motion. The Board entered into a closed session at 7:05 p.m. and resumed open session at
429 7:09 p.m.

Background

The City of Champaign intends to permanently close the City's 24-hour, publicly accessible recycling drop off site on December 31, 2010. The City's recycling drop-off site is used by city residents and by residents of outlying areas for recycling of materials such as cardboard, paper, glass, metal, and plastics. (Attachment A contains information about the closure of the City's recycling drop off site.)

This memorandum describes known recycling options expected to be available to County residents once the City of Champaign's recycling drop-off site is closed on December 31, 2010. The information provided in this memo includes:

- ▶ Which communities have access to residential curbside recycling service
- ▶ Other locally funded recycling drop-off sites in the County
- ▶ Local business proposal to operate a subscription-based alternative re-use/recycling/materials repurposing center at a site nearby the existing City of Champaign recycling drop-off site

Curbside Recycling

Curbside recycling service is generally available only to urban-area residents where sufficient quantities of residents live within close proximity to each other. Table 1 (on the following page) describes the availability of curbside recycling service to residents of communities in Champaign County.

Table 1: Curbside Recycling Service to Residents of Communities in Champaign County

City of Champaign	In 1992 the City required waste haulers to provide weekly curb-side recycling to residents of single-family to 4-unit dwellings. Residents have the option to request curbside recycling from their waste hauler, and waste haulers are required to provide this service at no extra cost to the resident. The City recently implemented a multifamily recycling program for apartment and multi-family buildings. Fees are currently \$2.60 per unit per month for a multi-family dwelling; \$1.30 x residential capacity per month for a dormitory (rooming house, fraternity/sorority); and a formula-based fee for commercial space in a mixed-use property).
Urbana	In 1995 Urbana adopted a Residential Recycling Tax Ordinance to fund the U-Cycle Program, a weekly residential curb-site recycling pick-up service operated by the City. The tax is \$2.50 per month per unit. Urbana operates a multifamily recycling program for residents in apartment buildings, dormitories, fraternities/sororities, rooming houses, condominiums, and buildings with 5 or more dwelling units. Fees include an apartment fee of \$2.50 per unit per month, and a dormitory (rooming house, fraternity/sorority) fee of \$2.00 per month times the legal number of occupants.
Rantoul	At least one local waste hauler offers a <u>once-a-month</u> curbside recycling service to residents, upon request, with an additional service charge required.
Savoy	At least one local waste hauler offers weekly curbside recycling service to residents, upon request, with no additional service charge required.
Mahomet	At least one local waste hauler offers a <u>once-a-month</u> curbside recycling service to residents, upon request, with an additional service charge required.
St. Joseph	At least one local waste hauler offers curbside recycling service to residents upon request, with no additional service charge required.
Tolono	At least one local waste hauler offers curbside recycling service to residents upon request, with no additional service charge required.
Allerton Bondville Broadlands Foosland Fisher Gifford Homer Ivesdale Longview Ludlow Ogden Pesotum Philo Royal Sadorus Sidney Thomasboro	No known provider of curbside recycling service to residents.

Recycling Drop-Off Sites Located Within the County¹

At present, there are four existing recycling drop off sites that operate within the communities of Homer, Ogden, Philo, and Tolono. These recycling drop-off sites are expected to continue to be available to residents of the following villages and/or townships, as local funds may continue to allow:

- ▶ Ogden Township and Village of Ogden (est. population: 1,601) Ogden Township funds a recycling drop-off site located in the Village of Ogden. Due to a recent Village general fund budget shortfall, the Village discontinued paying its previous share of the monthly operating cost for the drop off site. The Village continues to provide maintenance of the Village recycling drop-off site, as-needed. ABC Sanitary Hauling is the private waste hauler contracted to service the recycling drop off site on a weekly basis. (Monthly operating cost paid by Ogden Township)
- ▶ Village of Homer and South Homer Township (est. population: 1,585) The Village of Homer and South Homer Township jointly fund a recycling drop-off site located in the Village of Homer. ABC Sanitary Hauling is the private waste hauler contracted to service the recycling drop-off site on a weekly basis. (Monthly operating cost split 50/50 by Village of Homer and South Homer Township)
- ▶ Village of Philo and Philo Township (est. population: 1,768) The Village of Philo and Philo Township jointly fund a recycling drop-off site located in the Village of Philo. ABC Sanitary Hauling is the private waste hauler contracted to service the recycling drop-off site on a twice weekly basis. (Monthly operating cost split 30/70 by Philo Township and Village of Philo).
- ▶ Village of Tolono (est. population: 2,850) The Village of Tolono opened its recycling drop-off site in 2008 to serve village residents. The site is located adjacent to the Village Hall and is publicly accessible. ABC Sanitary Hauling is the private waste hauler contracted to service the recycling drop off site on a weekly basis. (Monthly operating cost fully funded by the Village of Tolono.)

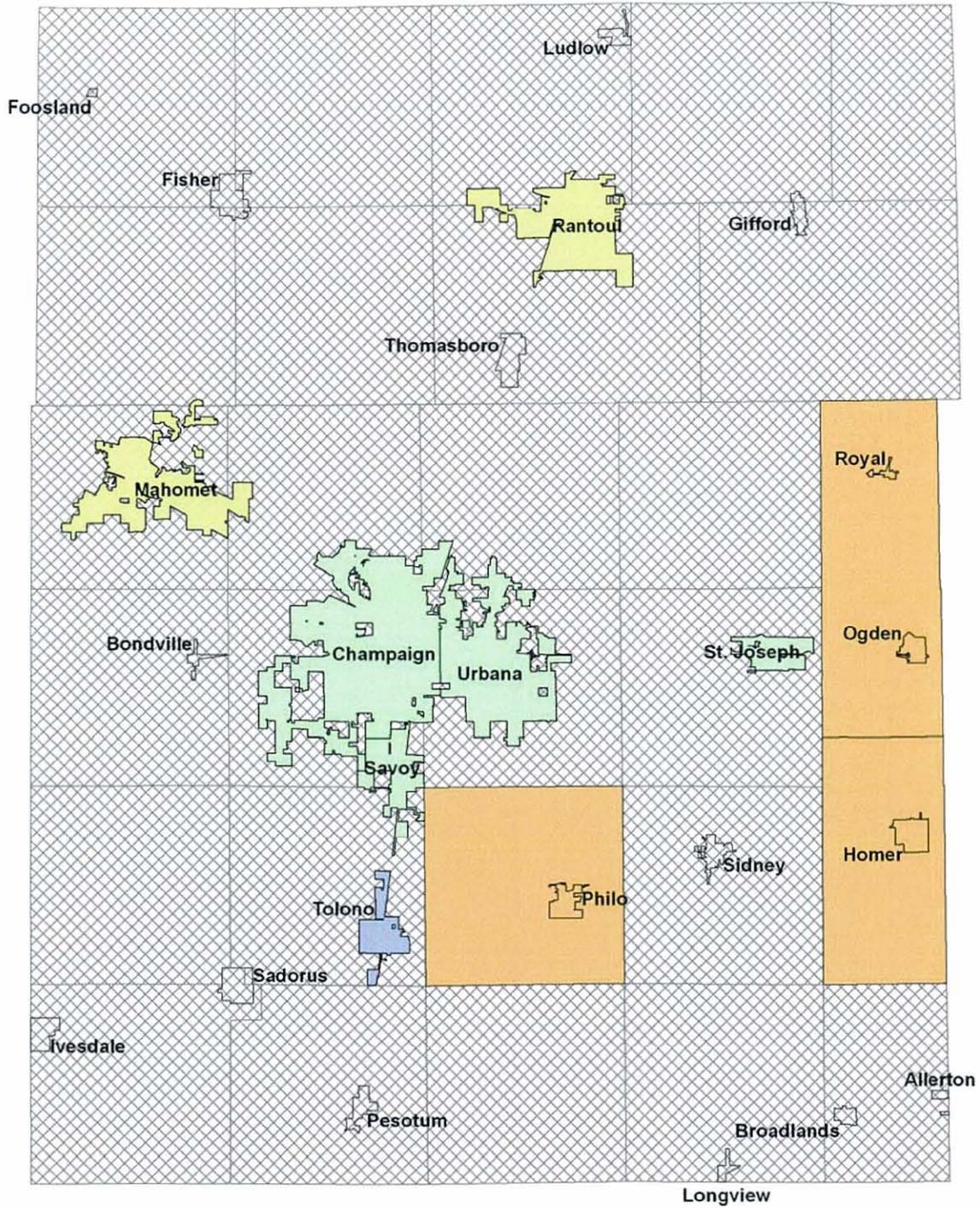
Curbside Recycling Pick-Up Service and Recycling Drop-Off Sites in Champaign County

Based on available information:

- ▶ Approximately 2/3 of the County residents have the option of curbside recycling service.
- ▶ In total, the four existing smaller-scale recycling drop-off sites funded solely or jointly by a Village or Township within Champaign County are intended to serve approximately 1/8 of the County population.

The map on the following page illustrates the availability of curbside recycling pick-up service and recycling drop-off sites expected to be available to County residents as of January 1, 2011.

Note 1: Two C-U area waste haulers privately operate a 'limited access' recycling drop off site on their premises. These recycling drop-off sites are not intended or designed to accommodate larger volumes of drop-off recycling, such as occurs at the City of Champaign recycling drop-off site.

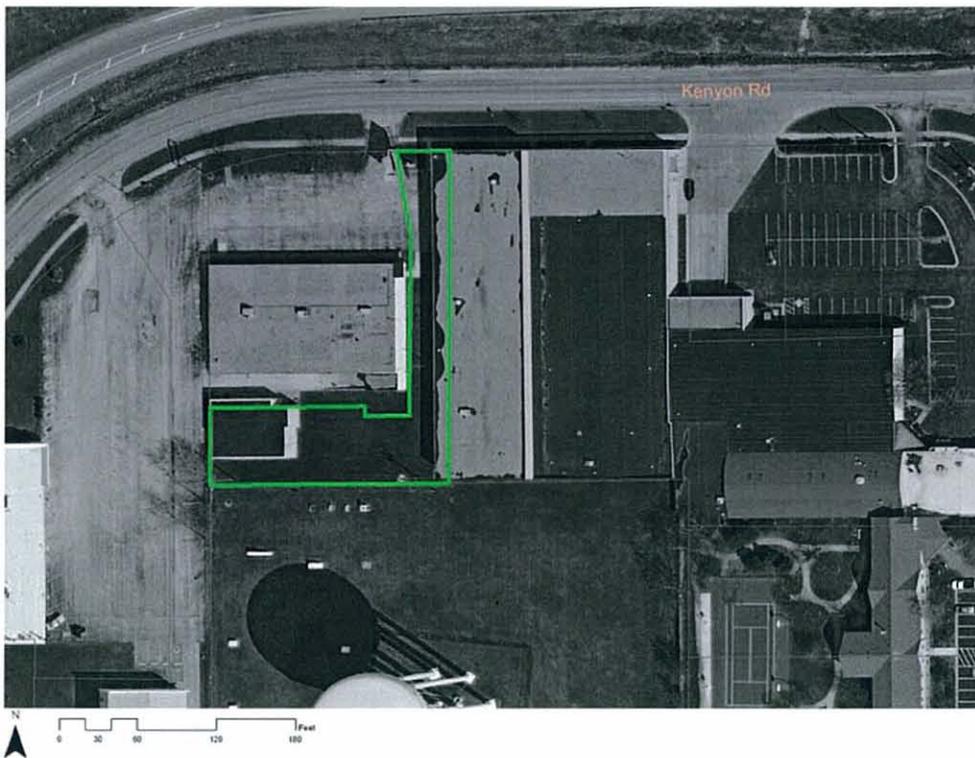
Steven Rosenberg, CEO of Green Purpose, LLC, is in the process of applying to the City of Champaign to rezone the 0.38 acre property located at 47 Kenyon Road in Champaign from 'General Business' to 'Light Industrial' zoning. The requested rezoning is necessary to allow Green Purpose to operate an alternative recycling center for the residents and businesses of Champaign and the surrounding areas. As soon as feasible during 2011, the company plans to offer access to a recycling center to individuals who pay a low monthly membership fee, and to implement a points system as a further incentive to members to recycle.

The Green Purpose proposal includes a store front for sale of re-purposed items from its eco-fashion clothing line, custom re-purposed furniture, and lightly-used items received from junk hauls and donations. **RESOLUTION REGARDING A PROPOSED CHEMICAL WASTE LANDFILL OVER
THE MAHOMET AQUIFER IN DEWITT COUNTY ILLINOIS**

WHEREAS, the Mahomet Aquifer is the source of water for most Champaign County residents and businesses; and

WHEREAS, the availability of adequate groundwater for the use of Champaign County residents and businesses including that provided by the Mahomet Aquifer is critical to the continued prosperity and growth of Champaign County; and

WHEREAS, alternative water sources to the Mahomet Aquifer for most Champaign County residents and businesses are not readily available without significant investment and possible adverse environmental considerations; and

WHEREAS, Clinton Landfill, Inc. of Clinton, Illinois, through its parent company Peoria Disposal Company of Peoria, Illinois, as well as its affiliated companies have applied to the United States Environmental Protection Agency for a permit to establish a Chemical Waste Landfill as a portion of the site known as the Clinton Landfill 3, located just south of Clinton, Illinois; and

WHEREAS, said site of the proposed Chemical Waste Landfill at the Clinton Landfill 3 is located immediately over a portion of the Mahomet Aquifer; and

WHEREAS, if permitted by the United States Environmental Protection Agency, the proposed Chemical Waste Landfill at the Clinton Landfill 3 would accept and bury Polychlorinated Biphenyl (PCB) solid waste; and

WHEREAS, such PCB materials are considered toxic chemical waste under the laws of the United States and are suspected to be carcinogenic and are linked to numerous health issues including cancer and non-cancer effects on the endocrine, reproductive and immune systems; and

WHEREAS, the proposed design of the Chemical Waste Landfill at the Clinton Landfill 3 cannot guarantee containment of the toxic materials forever or for a length of time consistent with Champaign County being a viable location for its present and future residents and businesses; and

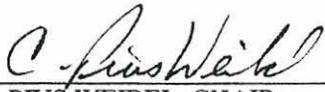
WHEREAS, any contamination of the Mahomet Aquifer by PCBs from the proposed Chemical Waste Landfill at the Clinton Landfill 3 can be expected to have deleterious effects on the quantity of water available from the Mahomet Aquifer for use by most Champaign County residents and businesses; and

WHEREAS, if the landfill owners become insolvent, they will no longer be financially responsible for the maintenance and oversight of the hazardous landfill, and instead that responsibility will fall upon the federal or state government to fulfill, creating a larger tax burden for many citizens, including the taxpayers of Champaign County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Champaign County Board, Champaign County, Illinois, as follows:

1. The County Board of Champaign County, Illinois opposes the permitting by the United States Environmental Protection Agency of the proposed Chemical Waste Landfill as a portion of the site known as the Clinton Landfill 3 to be located just south of Clinton, Illinois; and
2. The Champaign County Clerk is hereby authorized to provide a copy of this Resolution to the USEPA Region 5 Administrator Mary Gade, 77 West Jackson Boulevard, Chicago IL 60604, and refer to the application submitted by Clinton Landfill Inc. and directed to Margaret Guerriero, Director of Land and Chemicals Division.

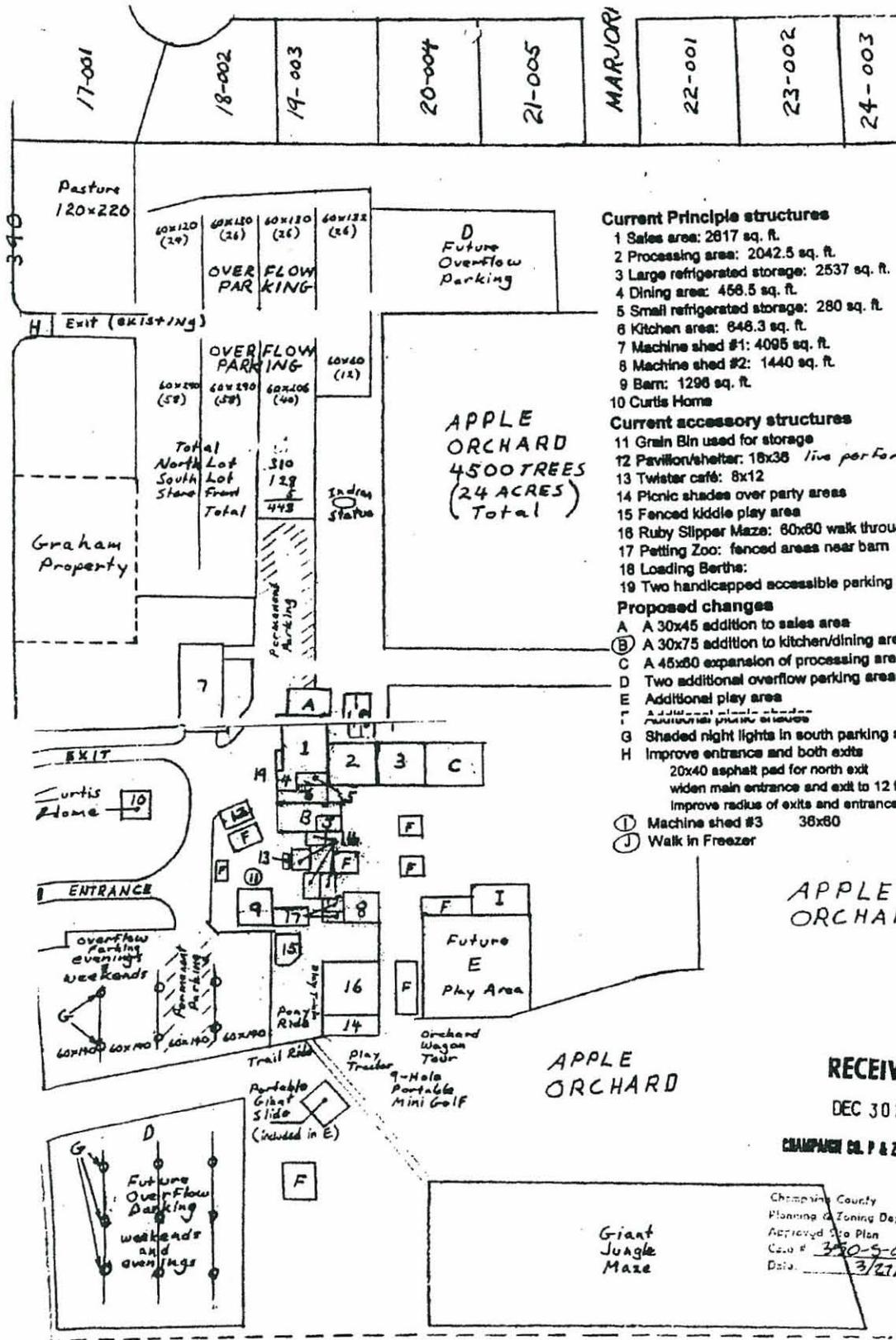

Dear Mr. Vandersnick:

I have your letter wherein you inquire whether non-home-rule counties are preempted from enacting zoning ordinances which regulate the mining of fossil fuels under either the Surface-Mined Land Conservation and Reclamation Act (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1991, ch. 96 1/2, par. 4501 et seq.; 225 ILCS 715/1 et seq.) or the Environmental Protection Act (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1991, ch. 111 1/2, par. 1001 et seq.; 415 ILCS 5/1 et seq.). For the reasons hereinafter stated, it is my opinion that non-home-rule counties may not regulate the mining of fossil fuels through their zoning powers.

Honorable Larry S. Vandersnick -2.

It is well established that non-home-rule counties possess only those powers which are expressly granted to them by the Constitution or by statute, together with those powers which are necessarily implied therefrom to effectuate the powers which have been expressly granted. (Redmond v. Novak (1981), 86 Ill. 2d 374, 382; Heidenreich v. Ronske (1962), 26 Ill. 2d 360, 362.) Under Division 5-12 of the Counties Code (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1991, ch. 34, pars. 5-12001 through 5-12019; 55 ILCS 5/5-12001 through 5/5-12019), counties have been granted the authority to regulate and to restrict the use of specified real property. Section 5-12001 of the Code (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1991, ch. 34, par. 5-12001; 55 ILCS 5/5-12001) provides, in pertinent part:

"Authority to regulate and restrict location and use of structures. For the purpose of promoting the public health, safety, morals, comfort and general welfare, conserving the values of property throughout the county, * * * the county board or board of county commissioners, as the case may be, of each county, shall have the power to regulate and restrict the location and use of buildings, structures and land for trade, industry, residence and other uses which may be specified by such board, to regulate and restrict the intensity of such uses, * * * to divide the entire county outside the limits of such cities, villages and incorporated towns into districts of such number, shape, area and of such different classes, according to the use of land and buildings, the intensity of such use * * * and other classification as may be deemed best suited to carry out the purposes of this Division; * * *.

* * *

"

(Emphasis added.)

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Under section 5-12001, counties possess the general authority to regulate mining through the exercise of their zoning powers. In 1970, however, the General Assembly enacted the Environmental Protection Act, of which subsection 2(b) (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1991, ch. 111 1/2, par. 1002(b); 415 ILCS 5/2(b)) provides:

" * * *

(b) It is the purpose of this Act, as more specifically described in later sections, to establish a unified, statewide program supplemented by private remedies, to restore, protect and enhance the quality of the environment, and to assure that adverse effects upon the environment are fully considered and borne by those who cause them.

* * * "

(Emphasis added.)

In interpreting the emphasized language of subsection 2(b), the Illinois Supreme Court has stated:

" * * *

* * * that, due to the Act's express purpose of 'establish[ing] a unified, state-wide program' to protect the environment [citation omitted] the Act was intended to preempt non-home-rule regulations. * * *

* * * "

(Village of Carpentersville v. The Pollution Control Board (1990), 135 Ill. 2d 463, 468.)

The court further stated, however, that because of subsequent amendments, the Act no longer preempts all local zoning

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ordinances. (Village of Carpentersville, 135 Ill. 2d at 468.) In this regard, section 39 of the Environmental Protection Act (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1991, ch. 111 1/2, par. 1039, as amended by Public Acts 87-895, effective August 14, 1992; 87-1213, effective September 26, 1992; 415 ILCS 5/39) provides, in pertinent part:

" * * *

(j) The issuance under this Act of a permit to engage in the surface mining of any resources other than fossil fuels shall not relieve the permittee from its duty to comply with any applicable local law regulating the commencement, location or operation of surface mining facilities.

* * * "

(Emphasis added.)

Illinois courts had previously indicated that under the provisions of the Surface-Mined Land Conservation and Reclamation Act, the State had exclusive authority to regulate surface mining. (See, American Smelting & Refining Co. v. County of Knox (1975), 60 Ill. 2d 133, 139-40; Lily Lake Road Defenders v. County of McHenry (1992), 231 Ill. App. 3d 858, 865-66; Union National Bank & Trust Co. v. Board of Supervisors of Kendall County (1978), 65 Ill. App. 3d 1004, 1008.) In 1981, however, section 2 of the Surface-Mined Land Conservation and Reclamation Act (Ill. Rev. Stat. 1991, ch. 96 1/2, par. 4502; 225 ILCS 715/2) was amended to provide, in pertinent part:

" * * *

The issuance of a permit under this Act to engage in the surface mining of any resources

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other than fossil fuels is not intended to relieve the permittee from its duty to comply with other applicable state and local law regulating the commencement, location and operation of surface mining facilities." (Emphasis added.)

The plain language of section 39 of the Environmental Protection Act and section 2 of the Surface-Mined Land Conservation and Reclamation Act, in requiring permittees generally to comply with local ordinances regulating surface mining, clearly demonstrates that the General Assembly no longer intends for either the Environmental Protection Act or the Surface-Mined Land Conservation and Reclamation Act to preempt local zoning ordinances with respect to most mining operations. Thus, it appears that counties may generally regulate the surface mining of natural resources through their zoning powers. By express exemption, however, the General Assembly has provided that permittees for surface mining of those resources which are characterized as fossil fuels are not required to comply with local ordinances regulating surface mining. Consequently, it is my opinion that non-home-rule counties are preempted from enacting zoning ordinances which regulate the mining of fossil fuels by the provisions of both the Surface-Mined Land Conservation and Reclamation Act and the Environmental Protection Act.
