CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS OF VETERANS ASSISTANCE COMMISION OF CHAMPAIGN COUNTY

ARTICLE I - NAME

Section 1. The name of this commission shall be "Veterans Assistance Commission of Champaign County".

ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

Section 1. The purpose of this commission is to promote the welfare of honorably discharged veterans of military service and their families; to act as a central service office for all veteran organizations included as members of this commission and to handle all government claims work referred to the Commission by member organizations; and to have general oversight of the distribution of all relief and supplies that may be appropriated for the benefit of military and their families and to formulate such rules and regulations in the commission that will enable it to carry out the purposed above set forth.

ARTICLE III – JURISDICTION

Section 1. The territory to be included within the jurisdiction of this Commission shall be the entire county of Champaign, Illinois.

ARTICE IV - OFFICE

Section 1. The headquarters and principal office of this Commission shall be in the Champaign County Courthouse or the Brookens Administrative Center.

ARTICLE V – MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. The membership to this Commission shall be composed of one delegate and one alternate from each of the different posts of the American Legion, the Veterans of Foreign Wars, the American Veterans of World War II (AmVets), Marine Corps League, Disabled American Veterans (DAV), Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America (IAVA) and other veterans organizations recognized by the Congress of the United States or the general assembly of the State of Illinois in the future. Each Delegate or Alternate must be a Honorably Discharged Veteran of the United States Armed Forces and must reside in Champaign County, Illinois. All Delegates and Alternates must have their eligibility certified in writing to the VAC Champaign prior to taking office.

Section 2. The following local veterans organizations are recognized and granted full voting membership: Champaign County Veterans Association, University of Illinois Veterans and Student Veterans at Parkland (SVAP).

Section 3. The following organizations shall be represented:

American Legion Post 24, Champaign American Legion Post 71, Urbana American Legion Post 287, Rantoul American Legion Post 290, Homer American Legion Post 433, Sidney American Legion Post 518, Ludlow American Legion Post 559, Champaign American Legion Post 580, Pesotum American Legion Post 634, St Joseph American Legion Post 996, Royal American Legion Post 998, Ogden American Legion Post 1015, Mahomet American Legion Post 1153, Penfield American Legion Post 1171, Philo American Legion Post 1492, Savoy AmVets Post 3, Champaign AmVets Post 52, Fisher VFW Post 630, Urbana VFW Post 5520, Champaign VFW Post 6750, Rantoul DAV Chapter 8, Champaign County Marine Corp League Detachment 1231 Champaign County Veterans Association University of Illinois Veterans Student Veterans at Parkland (SVAP)

Section 4. Any veteran's organization interested in the object and purpose of this Commission and can qualify under the Statutes of the State of Illinois, subject to the rules and regulations governing admission, may upon approval of the members of this Commission, become active members thereof and shall be represented by two of its members, one as delegate and one as alternate.

Section 5. No one delegate or alternate shall be permitted to vote for any organization other than the one they officially represent and they may only represent one organization at each meeting.

ARTICLE VI - OFFICERS

Section 1. Officers of this Commission shall be President, Vice President, Treasurer, Secretary, Judge Advocate and other officers and deemed necessary by the Commission.

Section 2. All officers shall be elected at the annual meeting in the month of November, and all officers so elected shall be installed and assume their duties at the next regular meeting following their election and shall continue in the office for one year until their successors are regularly elected and installed.

Section 3. Any member of this Commission shall be eligible to hold a Commission office.

Section 4. Vacancies in any office occurring during the year shall be filled by the members of this Commission. A vacancy shall exist when an officer is absent from regular meetings of said Commission for a period of time considered detrimental to the interest of said Commission provided that no vacancy shall be deemed to exist unless said officer shall have been absent for not less than three consecutive meetings. Elections to fill vacancies shall occur at the meeting following the vacancy notice to the commission.

ARTICLE VII – EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

Section 1. An Executive Committee, consisting of elected officers and two (2) other delegates elected by the Commission members.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall direct the work of the Commission in the interim between the regular meetings of the Commission. This Committee shall decide matters of policy and action to be taken in emergencies arising between regular meetings.

Section 3. A quorum of the Executive Committee shall consist of at least three members.

ARTICLE VIII - COMMITTEES

Section 1. There shall be an Executive Committee, which shall be composed of seven members of this Commission, including the President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Judge Advocate and two at large delegates. The Superintendent shall hold ex-officio status.

Section 2. The President shall, with the consent of the membership, appoint a Grievance Committee, to which a veteran may appeal for satisfaction if he/she feels that any injustice has been done to him/her by any employee of this Commission, either with reference to service or relief. This Committee shall consist of one member from each of the major veterans' organizations represented on this Commission.

Section 3. The president shall, with the consent of the membership, appoint such other Committees as shall be deemed advisable to carry out the purpose of this commission.

ARTICLE IX - MEETINGS

Section 1. The regular meeting of this Commission shall be held on the first Saturday of each month, at the hour of 2:30 p.m. Location of the meeting shall rotate between American Legion Post 24&71 and VFW Post 630&5520 and shall transact such business as may be properly brought before it.

Section 2. The regular meeting of this Commission held in the month of November of each year shall be the annual meeting, at which time all officers of this Commission shall be elected.

Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the President or two others members of this Commission and the Secretary shall give notice of such meetings by mailing a copy of the notice to all members of the Commission at least three days prior to the date of said meeting. The call shall state the purpose of the special meeting and no other business then that for which it is called shall be transacted.

Section 4. Procedures at all business meetings shall be governed by Roberts Rules of Order, except as herein otherwise provided or amended.

Section 5. Representatives from 13 member organizations shall constitute a quorum for the purpose of transacting and and all business at any meeting of the commission. Majority of Quorum shall be 9.

ARTICLE X – SUPERINTENDENT

Section 1. The Executive powers of this Commission shall be vested in the Superintendent, who shall be elected by the Commission to serve at the pleasure of the Executive Committee.

Section 2. The Superintendent of the Veteran's Assistance Commission shall appoint a Secretary to assist him/her in the duties of the office, subject to the approval of the Commission delegates.

Section 3. Neither the Superintendent or the Secretary shall be allowed to hold any office or any political office during employment as such Superintendent or Secretary/Assistant to the Superintendent.

Section 4. The Superintendent shall, under the direction of the Commission, maintain an office in the County County Courthouse or the Brookens Administrative Center; said office to be used solely by the Commission for the carrying out of its purposes.

Section 5. This office shall be provided, furnished and equipped by the County with all the necessary supplies, including desks, computers, telephones, printing, stationery and postage.

Section 6. This office shall be conducted in the interest of and for service to military veterans and their families and survivors who need assistance and for the rendering of such services as may be considered reasonable for carrying out the purposes of this Commission.

Section 7. The office shall be under the direction of the Superintendent further designated as Superintendent of Veterans Assistance Commission of Champaign County, who shall investigate and report to the Veterans Assistance Commission delegates all claims for relief under the law.

Section 8. The Superintendent and employees of the Commission may be bonded in the amount recommended by the Commission.

Section 9. The Superintendent shall receive annual salary in the amount recommended by this Commission and the office Staff also shall be properly compensated, in order to be able, to carry out intent of the Commission.

ARTICLE XI – SUPERINTENDENT'S ASSISTANTS

Section 1. The Superintendent shall appoint his Assistant from applications filed by veterans, spouses, widows and or dependents, if possible, subject to approval of the Commission Delegates.

ARTICLE XIII - AMENDMENTS

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a vote of two-thirds of the membership attending such regular meeting, provided that the proposed amendment shall have been given to all members of the Commission (delegates and alternates) at least five days in advance of the date when such amendment is to be acted upon, notifying said members that at such meeting a proposal to amend the By-Laws is to be voted upon.

Proposed Constitutional Changes December 2010 Veterans Assistance Commission of Champaign County Illinois

Change 1. Article V-Membership

Article V Section 1: Add "Iraq and Afghanistan Veterans of America (IAVA)" following DAV. Delete final sentence "See Chapter 10, exhibit 1."

Article V new Section 2: Add "The following local Veterans organizations shall be recognized and granted full voting membership: Champaign County Veterans Association (CCVA), University of Illinois Veterans and Student Veterans at Parkland (SVAP)." Renumber all sections sequentially.

Article V new Section 3: Add the following 3 organizations to the bottom of the listing in this section: Champaign County Veterans Association (CCVA), University of Illinois Veterans and Student Veterans at Parkland (SVAP). Correct the number of Rantoul VFW to 6750. Flip Amvets Posts to Numerical sequence.

Article V new Section 4: Delete final sentence "See Chapter 10, exhibit 2."

Article V new Section 5: Add the following phrase "and they may only represent one organization at each meeting."

Article IX Section 5: change Quorum to 13. Majority of Quorum to 9.

Change 2. Article VIII-Committees

Article VIII Section 1: Section is not in accordance with Article VII-Executive Committee. The section should read: "There shall be an Executive Committee, which shall be comprised of seven members of this commission, including President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, Judge Advocate and 2 at large members."

Change 3. Article VI-Officers and Article IX Meetings

These changes are intended to bring the commission time line into sync with the County Board operational year. The Champaign County Board operates on a December to November operational year.

Article VI Section 2: Change October to November.

Article_VI Section 4: Add final sentence" Elections to fill a vacancy shall occur at the meeting following a vacancy notice to the commission."

Article IX Section 1: Finalize regular meeting time and date. Recommendation of the Superintendent is Saturday at 2:30 Location of meeting to rotate between American Legion Posts 24 and 71, VFW Posts 630 and 5520. The Superintendent will publish a meeting schedule upon adoption of the motion.

Article IX Section 2: Change October to November.

Article IX Section 5: Delete duplicate "and".

The eligibility of each adult in the assistance unit is dependent upon the individual maintaining regular registration and corporation with IDES recommendations for employment and/or training, unless exempt as previously described.

SECTION 400 ASSISTANCE STANDARDS FOR FINANCIAL EVALUATION

All assistance and determination of need provided by the VACPC is predicated on the established standards set forth by IDHS. It is not the intent of either the Commission or the County to provide assistance either less than or in excess of the levels of assistance adopted by IDHS.

SECTION 500 ASSISTANCE LEVELS

Sub-Section 501 LEVEL OF ASSISTANCE

The total level of emergency assistance will not exceed \$1000 per year for a single Veteran. For each dependent the assistance will increase by \$100.

If the amount of emergency assistance exceeds the yearly amount it would have to be approved by the Executive and Finance Committees.

Rental and mortgage payments will not exceed \$500 monthly payment.

Sub-Section 502 ONE TIME EMERGENCY ASSISTANCE

If Veteran does not qualify for public aid link card there maybe a one time assistance grant if the emergency guidelines are met. This one time grant cannot exceed \$500 a year. Living beyond your means <u>cannot</u> cause indigence.

- 1. Veteran has unforeseen medical bill which causes indigence
- Veteran has emergency situation which causes indigence
- 3. Veteran is awaiting a decision from Unemployment and/or Social Security
- 4. Veteran has a recent death in the family

Sub-Section 503 HYGIENE PRODUCTS

VACPC vouchers will be given every 3 months only if Veteran qualifies for food stamps/link card and will not exceed \$35,00.

Sub-Section 504 UTILITIES

VACPC will only pay the latest or last month's bill and no monthly payment can exceed \$200.00

SECTION 600: ASSISTANCE ITEMS

VAC financial assistance is <u>not</u> public aid, township general assistance, or welfare. The Veterans Assistance Program is an emergency and interim financial assistance program and should not be considered an on-going financial supportive program over any considerable period of time. Veterans Assistance is <u>never</u> given in the form of cash.

The following assistance items are to be considered and may be included for Veterans Assistance:

Food: The VACPC provides food vouchers. Vouchers are only provided to Kroger for whom a
payment agreement has been prearranged between the vendor and the VACPC. Applicants
should check with the VACPC at the time of application to receive a copy of the current food
expense chart which is taken off the public aid chart Max Allotment for food stamps.

Food vouchers will only be given if the Veteran has his/her own residence and is not living with a family member. Food will be given while public aid is making a decision for food stamps/link card and in emergency situations.

- 2. Personal Hygiene: The VACPC provides personal hygiene vouchers. Personal hygiene needs include: toiletries, paper products, personal hygiene products, and minor first aid products. Applicants should check with the VACPC at the time of application for additional details regarding appropriate uses of and monetary limits for hygiene vouchers. Hygiene vouchers will only be given if the Veteran has his/her own residence and is not living with a family member.
- Shelter: Shelter costs will be allowed according to the applicant's/recipient's living arrangements
 and the maximum allowable assistance level to the eligible applicant. All shelter costs are paid
 directly to the person or agency(s) to whom payment is due.

Veteran must have made a shelter payment within the last 90 days and show a reasonable effort to make payment.

Veteran must have a lease agreement in the Veteran or his/her spouse's name.

Payment will not be made for rental deposits, security deposits, delinquent rental payments or payments to relatives of the applicant unless rental involves a separate dwelling unit. The VACPC will not pay rent if Veteran is renting a room from a family member or person other than the landlord.

Subsidized Housing - Applicants receiving Section 8 housing vouchers or living in HUD subsidized units may only be eligible for limited assistance as determined by agreements with the local Housing Authority. Applicants/recipients must meet the eligibility requirements for Emergency Veterans Assistance and the amount of aid can't exceed \$500 in any 24 month period. All such assistance shall be reported directly to the Peoria County Housing Authority. Applicants living with a Section 8 client or subsidized unit recipient shall not be granted housing or utility assistance.

- 4. Utilities: All utility costs shall be paid directly to the persons, agencies, and/or companies to whom payment is due. The VACPC does not pay past-due late charges, deposits, service charges or re- connection fees for discontinued services. VACPC will not make payment if a pledge from another agency has been made in the last 90 days, and Veteran must have made a payment within the last 90 days and show a reasonable effort to pay off the bill. The utility bill must be in the name of the Veteran or his/her spouse before payment is made.
- Transportation: A Veteran, if qualified, may receive travel expense paid (by the cheapest means
 of public transportation available) to the nearest Veterans Administration Medical Center when:

veteran was discharged for a disability incurred in the line of duty (not as a result of the members own misconduct) that was found to be service connected by the US Department of Veterans Affairs

The Last Period of Service refers to veterans who had more than one period of active military service and more than one discharge.

Honorable Discharge is a discharge in which the character of discharge is described as honorable and General Under Honorable Conditions.

Active Military Service is full time service in a branch of the United States Military as opposed to Reserve duty where a member is still in the military but not actively engaged. Active duty for training, service as a Cadet or Midshipman at the United States Military Academy, the United States Naval Academy, United States Coast Guard Academy, United States Air Force Academy, or in any component of the Reserve Officers Training Corps is not considered as qualifying service.

Veterans Who Began Active Service after September 7, 1980 must complete a minimum of 24 consecutive months of active duty or one day of combat during a period of hostilities as recognized by the President and Congress of the United States of America.

Veterans Who Began Active Service Before September 8, 1980 must complete a minimum of 181 consecutive active duty days or one day of combat during a period of hostilities as recognized by the President and Congress of the United States of America.

Reservists or National Guard Members who were involuntarily activated or federalized by the President of the United States or the Secretary of Defense during a period of hostility, served in the theater of hostility, and completed the term for which the member was activated.

Any Honorably Discharged Reservist or National Guard Member who was federally activated and served honorably for a minimum of 24 consecutive active duty months for service other than active duty for training.

Misconduct – involves deliberate or intentional wrongdoing with knowledge of or wanton and reckless disregard of its probable consequences. Such a discharge would bar a veteran from Veterans Assistance.

Service Connected Disability - A chronic illness or injury found to be related to the veterans military service to a degree of 0% or greater by the US Department of Veterans Affairs.

Sub-Section 702

U.S. CITIZEN STATUS

To be eligible for Veterans Assistance from the VACPC, an applicant must be a U.S. Citizen or a legal resident of the United States.

Sub-Section 703

STATE AND COUNTY RESIDENCY

As provided by the Illinois Counties Code (55 ILCS 5/5-2006), the funds provided by the VACPC for its assistance programs are obtained solely from appropriated tax moneys levied on property owners in Peoria County. Therefore, all veterans, and their families, seeking assistance from the VACPC shall be residents of the State of Illinois and shall have been residents of the County of Peoria for at least sixty (60) consecutive days prior to seeking assistance, with no present intent to move from Peoria County.

If a resident is temporarily absent from Peoria County and an application for assistance has been made, he/she meets the residency requirements if the absence does not exceed sixty (60) calendar days and a permanent home is not established elsewhere.

- There is a prior authorization from the Medical Center. Veteran must be referred by VA Van Coordinator;
- Veteran is looking for employment. A monthly City Link bus pass may be issued. Veteran must be referred by IDES or Unemployment.
- Veteran has found employment and needs public transportation to get to work until his first paycheck arrives. Veteran must show proof of hire.
- 6. Indigent Burial: The Illinois Counties Code authorizes the Peoria County Board to bear the expense of interment of honorably discharged veterans of selected conflicts and certain family members. These individuals must not have sufficient means to defray the funeral expenses of the deceased, and family members who are receiving public assistance at the time of Veteran's demise are ineligible for this burial expense assistance. The expense of such burial shall not exceed \$900 and such burial shall not be made in any burial ground or cemetery used exclusively for the burial of paupers, nor in a portion of any cemetery or burial ground reserved for paupers (55 ILCS 5/5-27001 et seq.).

The County shall pay the expenses of such burial for the veteran, or the veteran's parents, spouse, surviving spouse, or minor children, providing the deceased was a resident of the county at the time of his/her demise. The VACPC has been appointed to represent the Peoria County Board in this matter. Such burial assistance expense shall be borne by the Peoria County General Fund and not the Veterans Assistance Fund.

 Miscellaneous/Other: Applicants should check with the VACPC at the time of application to see whether any other/additional benefits or programs may be available to them at that time.

SECTION 700 SERVICE AND RESIDENCY ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

All applicants for assistance from the VACPC must meet the eligibility requirements set forth in the following sub-sections. Additionally, cooperation throughout the application process by applicants for assistance is required for the VACPC to determine eligibility.

For the purposes of the VACPC, the Armed Forces of the United States are deemed to include the United States Army, United States Navy, United States Marine Corps, United States Air Force, United States Coast Guard and all organizations listed in the most current edition of the USDVA handbook, Federal Benefits for Veterans and Dependents.

Sub-Section 701 DOCUMENTATION OF HONORABLE DISCHARGE

Applicants for assistance from the VACPC must present a DD-214 or Certificate of Service showing Honorable Discharge or Under Honorable Conditions. If the applicant does not have a DD-214 or Certificate of Service, he/she must authorize the VACPC to obtain a copy from the appropriate U.S. Department of Defense records center.

Applicants must provide the VACPC with true and complete information. If an applicant makes a misrepresentation to obtain benefits or fails to reimburse the VACPC, the applicant shall be red flagged for a minimum of twelve (12) months. If an applicant makes a misrepresentation to obtain benefits, that applicant may also be: (a) fined, (b) charged with a crime, and/or (c) sued for fraud.

Eligible Veteran for VAC Assistance – A veteran whose last period of active military service was Honorable and met the time in service requirement for the era in which the veteran serviced unless the AMVETS POST 3

MILITARY VETERANS ASSISTANCE ACT

45/0.01.

Short Title

0.01. Short title. This Act may be cited as the Military Veterans Assistance Act. Laws 1907. p. 79, 0.01, added by P.A. 86-1324, 205, eff, Sept. 6, 1990. Amended by P.A. 87-796, 1.2, eff. Dec. 16, 1991.

Title of Act

An ACT to regulate the granting of assistance to military veterans and their families. Laws 1907, p. 79, approved May 25, 1907, eff. July 1, 1907. Title amended by Laws 1945, p. 396, 2 approved and eff. July 17, 1945; P.A. 87-796, 1.3, certified and eff. Dec 16, 1991.

45/1. Overseer of Military Assistance

Sec. 1. The term "Overseer of the military veterans assistance," as used in this Act, shall be construed to mean all persons whose duty it is, under the existing statutes, to care for, relieve or maintain, wholly or in part, any person who may be entitled to such assistance under the statutes of the State of Illinois. This Act shall not infringe upon the mandated powers and authorities vested in the Illinois Department of Veterans' Affairs. Laws 1907, p. 79, 1, eff. July 1, 1907. For the assistance of military veterans, who served in the armed forces of the United States, whose last discharge from the service was honorable to be eligible for assistance, their families, and the families of deceased veterans with service as described in this Section who need assistance. The supervisor of general assistance or the county board shall provide such sums of money as may be just and necessary to be drawn by the commander, quartermaster or commandant of any post, ship, camp, chapter or detachment or any congressionally chartered or state chartered veterans organization, in the city or town, or the superintendent of any Veterans' Assistance Commission of the county, upon the recommendation of the assistance committee of the post, ship, camp, chapter or Veterans Assistance Commission. Sec. 6. Overseers of military veterans assistance are hereby prohibited from sending military veterans (or their families or the families of those deceased) to any almshouse (or orphans asylum) without the full concurrence and consent of the commander and organization, having jurisdiction as provided in sections 2 and 3 of this Act. Sec. 9. In counties having 2 or more posts, camps, chapters or detachments of military veterans organizations, as may be recognized by law, a central assistance committee may be organized to be known as the Veterans Assistance Commission of such county, composed of one delegate and one alternate form each of such posts, camps, units and chapters of ship selected annually as determined by each post, ship, camp or chapters. When so organized a commission shall be clothed with all the powers and charged with all the duties therefore devolving upon the different posts and chapters as provided in Section 2.

The Commission superintendent and the president or chairman of the county board, or some other county officer appointed by him shall have general oversight of the distribution of all moneys and supplies appropriated by the county for the benefit of military veterans and their families, subject to such rules, regulations and administrative procedures or audit reviews as are necessary as approved by the county board to carry out the spirit and intent of this Act. No warrant authorized under this Act may be issued for the payment of money without the presentation of an itemized statement of claim, approved by the superintendent of the commission.

If general assistance funds are allocated to a county for assistance to military veterans and their families as provided in "The Illinois Public Aid Code", the administration of such funds and of county tax funds levied for such purpose as provided in Section 5-2006 of the Counties Code shall be subject to the supervision of the Illinois Department of Public Aid in accordance with the provisions of the Illinois Public Aid Code. The superintendent of the Veterans Assistance Commission must comply with the procedures and regulations adopted by the Veterans Assistance Commission and the regulations of the Illinois Department of Public Aid. To further the intent of this Act of assisting military veterans, this Act is to be construed so that the Veterans Assistance Commission shall provide needed services to eligible veterans

The superintendent and other employees shall be employees of the Veterans Assistance Commission, and no provision in this Section or elsewhere in this Act shall be construed to mean that they are elsewhere in this Act shall be construed to mean that they are employees of the county.

Superintendents, subject to rules formulated by the commission, shall select, as far as possible, secretaries and other employees from among Honorably discharge military veterans as defined in Section 2, or their surviving spouses.

Superintendents of all counties subject to this Act, when required by the commission, shall bond in the sum of \$2,000 for the faithful performance of their duties.

All persons elected or selected to fill positions provided for in this section shall be exempt from the operation and provisions of the civil service act or laws of this State, and the secretary of the commission shall be appointed by the superintendent. However, if "The Illinois Public Aid Code", as amended, becomes applicable in any county, the State Department of Public Aid may exercise the powers therein designated in relation to employees engaged in the administration of assistance under this act.

Local governmental units

As provided in Article VI, Local Governmental units shall provide funds for and administer the programs provided in that Article subject, where so provided, to the supervision of the Illinois Department. Incorporated towns which have superseded civil townships shall provide funds for and administer the public aid program provided by Article VI,

In counties of less that 3 million population having a County Veterans Assistance Commission in which there has been levied a tax as authorized by Section 5-2006 of the Counties Code for the purpose of providing assistance to military veterans and their families, the County Veterans Assistance Commission shall administer the programs provided by Article VI for such military veterans and their families as seek aid through the County Veterans Assistance Commission.

If a majority of the electors vote in favor of the revised proposition, the county board may, annually, levy the tax The proceeds of any tax so levied shall be used as authorized. exclusively for the assistance purposed authorized thereunder, and a portion thereof may be expended for the salaries or expenses of any officers or employees of the Veterans Assistance Commission of for any other expenses incident to the administration of such assistance.

The tax shall be in addition to all other taxes which the county is authorized to levy on the aggregate valuation of the property within the county and shall not be included in any tax limitation of the rate upon which taxes are required to be extended, but shall be excluded therefrom and in addition thereto. The tax shall be levied and collected in like manner as the general taxes of the county, and, when collected, shall be paid into a special fund in the county treasury and used only herein authorized.

The limitations on tax rates herein provided may be increased or decreased under the referendum provision so the General Revenue Law of Illinois.





Members of the Veteran's Assistance Commission are appointed by each of the veterans' organizations in the County. The Commission provides emergency relief to indigent veterans, assists veterans in gaining earned benefits, and advocates for veterans. The Department is supported through a special property tax levy. The Veterans' Assistance levy maximum rate is \$0.03 per \$100 assessed valuation.


To provide interim financial aid and services to qualifying Peoria County veterans and their families in the form of food, utilities, shelter, transportation, and medical, as well as provide advocacy services to such veterans applying for local, state, or federal assistance.

BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS:

Overall revenues increase modestly in 2011 to \$173,730, an increase of \$3,765 or 2.2%. Revenues are higher because of 1.5% increase in the EAV for the property tax and a rebound in PPRT revenues from the State of Illinois.

Expenses are recommended to incline \$10,617 for 2011. biggest area of concern going forward is the amount of Emergency Relief needed by the County's veterans. An additional appropriation was requested at the time of budget submittal in 2010 and this line item will need to be monitored closely in 2011, as the recession has severely impacted those who have proudly served our country and prompted unprecedented requests rellef. emergency This department's core service providing emergency relief to veterans who need it, and this function was recently named in a survey as one of the most Important services for Peoria County to provide to its citizens.


Revenue-

The property tax rate for 2011 will remain the same as 2010 at the rate of 0.0037 cents per \$100 of assessed valuation but revenue will increase slightly due to EAV growth. Personal Property Replacement Taxes for 2011 are projected to increase somewhat for 2010. PPRT revenues fell significantly in 2009 compared with 2008, especially in the first half of the year as the recession took hold in Illinois and locally.

Expense-

Expenditures have decreased 5.8% for 2010. Emergency Relief has been increased \$8,000 for 2011 following the surge in demand experienced in the summer and fall of 2010. This demand is anticipated to remain high in 2011 until unemployment begins to improve. The cost of a new

software program, Virtual Veteran, has been shifted to IT Services. The estimated cost of this software is around \$9,000.




