CALL TO ORDER:

Dr. Townsend called the meeting to order at 5:30 p.m.

ROLL CALL:

Roll call was taken and a quorum was present.



CITIZEN INPUT / PUBLIC PARTICIPATION:

Nancy Carter and Elijah Griffin from the National Alliance for the Mentally Ill (NAMI) spoke in support of Ebertfest as an anti-stigma effort for the CCMHB.



ADDITIONS TO AGENDA:

None.

CCDDB INFORMATION:

Ms. Canfield reported on the CCDDB meeting held earlier in the day. Dr. Rappaport stated he would like to have discussions between the CCMHB and CCDDB when the two Boards are voting separately on issues that affect both Boards.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES:

Minutes from the November 16, 2016 Board meeting was included in the Board packet for approval.

MOTION: Dr. Moore made a motion to approve the minutes from the November 16, 2016 Board meeting. Dr. Fowler seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken and the motion passed.

PRESIDENT'S COMMENTS:

Dr. Townsend announced she would be leaving the CCMHB after 16 years and stated it had been an honor to serve on the Board.

EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR'S COMMENTS:

Ms. Canfield provided a verbal report on her recent activities

STAFF REPORTS:

Reports from Mr. Driscoll and Ms. Summerville were included in the packet.

CONSULTANT'S REPORT:

No Report.

BOARD TO BOARD:

Dr. Fowler attended a community advisory board meeting held by Rosecrance, Inc.

AGENCY INFORMATION:

Ms. Sheila Ferguson from Rosecrance, Inc. provided information on new services offered by the agency. Printed materials were distributed to Board members.



Ms. Becca Obuchowski from Community Choices announced a new self-advocacy group with the agency.

NEW BUSINESS:

Champaign Community Coalition 2016 Summer Youth Initiative Presentation:

Mr. Tracy Parsons reported on the successful Champaign County Community Coalition's 2016 Summer Youth Initiative. A copy of the presentation was included in the Board packet. Board members were given an opportunity to ask questions and make comments following the presentation.

Organizational Assessment:

A Decision Memorandum authorizing the Executive Director and Presidents of the CCMHB and the CCDDB to engage a consultant to evaluate the organization and its operations was included in the Board packet. The CCDDB and CCMHB share administrative services with new leadership. This transition offers an opportunity to improve the organization in deliberate ways. An outside consultant with relevant experience may be best able to integrate input from board members, staff, and stakeholders and recommend specific enhancements and guidance to the Director.

MOTION: Dr. Moore moved to approve the Executive Director negotiating and executing a contract, with approval of the presidents of the CCDDB and CCMHB, for external evaluation of the organization and its operations. Ms. White seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken and the motion unanimously passed.

Anti-Stigma Event:

A Decision Memorandum on sponsorship of an anti-stigma film and concurrent anti-stigma activities at the 2017 Roger Ebert's Film Festival was included in the Board packet.

The Roger Ebert's Film Festival is the centerpiece of our anti-stigma efforts in Champaign County. Our status as a primary sponsor has grown over the years, reaping increased exposure and media coverage, special attention from Chaz Ebert and festival staff, high-profile concurrent art exhibits, and increased collaboration with alliance members, university students, and community stakeholders in ongoing and future 'pro-inclusion' partnerships. Supports Mental Health, Developmental Disabilities, and Substance Use Disorder community awareness and education.

The total cost for the event/sponsorship was initially anticipated to be \$30,000, divided between the CCMHB and CCDDB. The CCDDB share is charged as part of the administrative fee paid under the Intergovernmental Agreement. Total cost is reduced by contributions from Alliance members and ticket sales. In FY16, members contributed \$6,500.



Related Actions to Date: On June 22, 2016, the CCMHB approved "up to \$17,355 as the CCMHB share, contingent on approval of \$12,645 by the CCDDB, to sponsor an anti-stigma film and concurrent anti-stigma activities at the 2017 Roger Ebert's Film Festival." At the July 20th meeting of the CCDDB, the motion "to approve up to \$12,645 as the CCDDB share, with CCMHB approved share of up to \$17,355 to sponsor an anti-stigma film" was tabled until new members were seated and a new director hired. A lower sponsorship cost has been negotiated, at \$15,000. The cost of concurrent activities and promotions can be offset by contributions. At their December 14, 2016 meeting, the CCDDB will decide whether to approve funding for film sponsorship and related anti-stigma activities. If the CCDDB decides NOT to approve up to \$6,322.50 to sponsor an anti-stigma film and activities, with CCMHB cost to \$8,677.50, the CCMHB may choose to approve the entire cost of sponsorship and activities or not to sponsor a film in the 2017 festival. Board members discussed this anti-stigma effort at length.

MOTION: Dr. Fowler moved to approve up to \$15,000 to sponsor an anti-stigma film and concurrent anti-stigma activities at the 2017 Roger Ebert's Film Festival. Dr. Robin seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken. The following members voted aye: Fowler, Palencia, Moore, O'Connor, Rappaport, Robin, Townsend. White voted nay. The motion passed.

Tap In Leadership Academy Contract Amendment:

A Decision Memorandum to authorize an amendment to reduce the Tap In Leadership Academy contract was included in the Board packet. The Tap In Leadership Academy has not implemented the program for which it was awarded a contract by the Board, but they have been receiving monthly payments. The program will not start up until before late January 2017. Communications between Ms. Sally Carter, the agency executive director and CCMHB staff was included in the Board packet and distributed. The amount of the contract award was \$35,000. Five monthly payments have been made to the agency for a combined total of \$14,580. However, a temporary hold has been placed on the December payment pending action on the amendment by the Board.

MOTION: Ms. Palencia moved to authorize staff to issue an amendment to Tap In Leadership Academy contract (MHB17-035) to reduce the contract maximum by 50% from \$35,000 to \$17,500 and adjust future payments as necessary to account for the reduction in the contract award.

MOTION: Dr. Fowler moved to accept the Three-Year Plan with FY17 Objectives as presented. Dr. Rappaport seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously.

A Decision Memorandum on the FY18 Allocation Criteria was included in the Board packet for review and discussion.

> Dr. Rappaport moved to accept the FY18 **MOTION:** Allocation Criteria as presented. Dr. Fowler seconded the motion. A voice vote was taken and the motion passed unanimously.

Staff Report - January 18, 2017 Board Meeting

Summary of Activity

<u>Allocation Process</u>: The online system opened for applications on January 4th for the 2018 allocation cycle. Prior to opening the system, all applications receiving a contract for 2017 were cloned enabling existing grantees to use the prior year's application as a starting point. Instructions were reviewed and minor revisions made prior to posting to the system on January 5th. A technical issue with the new agency registration process was identified and was promptly corrected. Several providers have expressed interest in applying for the first time to the Board. Technical assistance with the system is being provided on request.

Contract Amendment: The amendment to Tap In Leadership Academy contract and cover letter have been completed and hand delivered. The letter addresses the issue at hand and the required revisions to the program and financial forms as well as guidance on compliance with other provisions of the contract. A meeting with Ms. Carter and a financial services representative was held to review the amendment, required action, and status of the agency and program. The Kickback Lounge is schedule to open on Friday January 13th. To start, the program will be open only on Fridays using volunteers. Hiring of staff and expansion to Saturday and Sunday hours will follow once the state approves the 21st Century grant application. This grant will enable the agency to hire staff for an after school enrichment program. CCMHB funds will pay the same staff to work at the Kickback Lounge as well as pay fixed costs.

The contract with EMK Consulting for technical assistance and support to the online application and reporting system has been renewed.

Criminal Justice - Mental Health: The Crisis Intervention Team Steering Committee (CITSC) met in early January. A draft analysis of Urbana Police Department CIT contacts over the last four years was shared with the group. The contacts are broken out by day oy week, month of year, and where recorded, time of day. The data is useful for understanding when high volume periods have been experienced and shifts that have occurred over time in those high volume periods. Also discussed was the ARMS CIT form (draft) that Urbana, Champaign, Rantoul and University of Illinois Police Departments and the Sheriff's Office will use once testing is completed, to track CIT contacts. Eventually this will enable departments to track contacts across jurisdictions. Those present also received an update on the men's emergency shelter and how it can be utilized by law enforcement.

The regular monthly meetings of the Reentry Council and the Crisis Response Planning Committee (CRPC) were pushed back to January 11th. The Reentry Council will have a discuss priorities for the coming year. A draft systems mapping gaps analysis report will be reviewed at the CRPC meeting.

Following the Drug Court graduation at the Urbana Civic Center on December 21st, a wonderful event by the way, the Specialty Court Steering Committee met the Champaign County Courthouse. Champaign County has submitted an application for state certification of the Drug Court program. New state standards were approved last year requiring local drug courts to be



certified and meet state standards. Data collection and reporting to the state required under the standards was discussed. Additional information on the nature of the data to be collected and with whom it will be shared is needed to determine if additional consents to release information are required.

Other Activity: Participated in various meetings and other events. On December 13th I attended a press conference held by Champaign County Health Care Consumers about the health insurance open enrollment period, where people can get in-person help with their enrollment, and recap pass success in enrollment efforts in Champaign County. The main topic at the United Way Community Impact Committee meeting in January focused on outcome measurement requirements for UW funded agencies and agencies capacity to meet expectations. Related to this topic, the U of I program evaluators are holding logic model training in December and January for CCMHB funded agencies. At the Continuum of Care and Council of Service Providers to the Homeless meeting, plans for a temporary men's emergency shelter were announced. Two churches are working together to provide shelter to up to 30 men a night for the months of January through March.

CODE OF ETHICS FOR BOARD MEMBERS

The Members of the Champaign County Mental Health Board (CCMHB) and the Champaign County Developmental Disabilities Board (CCDDB) must be able to act in a manner that maintains their integrity and independence but at the same time is responsive to the interests and needs of those to whom they are accountable. As decision makers responsible for public dollars, they are obligated to arrive at fair and unbiased allocation choices based on the best value and the best interests of people with disabilities in Champaign County. Board Members must be aware of their obligation to conform their behavior to standards of ethical conduct which warrants the trust of the public. Characteristics and behaviors consistent with these standards include:

- 1. Board Members shall act with integrity and in an ethical and professional manner in their interactions with each other, the Executive Director, the Champaign County Board, consultants, advisors, and the public.
- 2. Board Members shall not engage in conduct that would compromise, discredit, or diminish the integrity of the CCDDB/CCMHB.
- 3. Board Members will respect the authority of the Executive Director and will provide instruction and direction only to the executive director.
- 4. Board Members will operate with the understanding that they represent and are accountable to the people of Champaign County.
- 5. Board Members will strive to establish sound working relationships with each other and will not use Board meetings to upstage or embarrass colleagues.
- 6. Board Members will respectfully consider the opinions of others during deliberations, strive for consensus building in decision-making, and respect the judgment of the Board with regard to its decisions.
- 7. Board Members will refrain from using Board meetings or decisions to advance their personal agenda.
- 8. Board Members will strive to cultivate and maintain good relations with the public, the press, and constituent groups, and will recognize their limitations to speak or take positions for the Board.
- 9. Board Members shall refer all proposals or other communications regarding potential or existing programs, contracts, or services to the Executive Director.
- 10. Board Members shall not communicate with persons under consideration for selection by the Board or Executive Director for contracts, or while the procurement and/or allocation process is in progress.
- 11. Board Members shall not participate in a breach of this code by another member, contribute to the concealment of such a breach, or knowingly or negligently allow such a breach to occur.

ABA – Applied Behavioral Analysis. An intensive behavioral intervention targeted to autistic children and youth and others with associated behaviors.

ACA – Affordable Care Act

ACMHAI - Association of Community Mental Health Authorities of Illinois

APN – Advance Practice Nurse

ASAM – American Society of Addiction Medicine. May be referred to in regards to assessment and criteria for patient placement in level of treatment/care.

ASD – Autism Spectrum Disorder

ASQ – Ages and Stages Questionnaire. Screening tool used to evaluate a child's developmental and social emotional growth.

ATOD – Alcohol, Tobacco and Other Drugs

CADC – Certified Alcohol and Drugs Counselor, substance abuse professional providing clinical services that has met the certification requirements of the Illinois Alcoholism and Other Drug Abuse Professional Certification Association.

CANS – Child and Adolescent Needs and Strengths. The CANS is a multipurpose tool developed to support decision making, including level of care, service planning, and monitoring of outcomes of services.

CBCL - Child Behavior Checklist.

CC - Champaign County

CCBoH – Champaign County Board of Health

C-GAF – Children's Global Assessment of Functioning

CILA – Community Integrated Living Arrangement

CLC – Cultural and Linguistic Competence

CQL - Council on Equality and Leadership

CSEs - Community Service Events. Is a category of service measurement on the Part II utilization form and the actual activity to be performed should also be described in the Part I Program Performance Measures-Utilization section of the application/program plan. It relates to the number of public events (including mass media and articles), consultations with community groups and/or caregivers, classroom presentations, and small group workshops to promote a program or educate the community. Activity (meetings) directly related to planning such events may also be counted here. Actual direct service to clientele is counted elsewhere.

CSPI – Childhood Severity of Psychiatric Illness. A mental heath assessment instrument.

CY – Contract Year, runs from July to following June. For example CY08 is July 1, 2007 to June 30, 2008. (Also may be referred to as Program Year – PY). Most contract agency Fiscal Years are also from July 1 to June 30 and may be interpreted as such when referenced in a Program Summary e.g. FY07

CYFS – Center for Youth and Family Solutions (formerly Catholic Charities)

DASA – Division of Alcoholism and Substance Abuse in the Illinois Department of Human Services.

DCFS - Illinois Department of Children and Family Services.

Detox – abbreviated reference to detoxification. It is a general reference to drug and alcohol detoxification program or services, e.g. Detox Program.

DD - Developmental Disability

DFI – Donated Funds Initiative, source of matching funds for some CCMHB funded contracts. The Illinois Department of Human Services administers the DFI Program funded with federal Title XX Social Services Block Grant. The DFI is a "match" program meaning community based agencies must match the DFI funding with locally generated funds. The required local match is 25 percent of the total DFI award.

DHFS – Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services. Previously known as IDPA (Illinois Department of Public Aid)

DHS – Illinois Department of Human Services

DMHARS – Division of Mental Health and Addiction Recovery Services. This is the new division at the Department of Human Services that brings together the Division of Alcohol and Substance Abuse and the Division of Mental Health.



DSM - Diagnostic Statistical Manual.

DSP - Direct Support Professional

DT - Developmental Training

El – Early Intervention

EPDS – Edinburgh Postnatal Depression Scale – Screening tool used to identify mothers with newborn children who may be at risk for prenatal depression.

EPSDT – Early Periodic Screening Diagnosis and Treatment. Intended to provide comprehensive and preventative health care services for children under age 21 who are enrolled in Medicaid.

ER - Emergency Room

FACES – Family Adaptability and Chesion Evaluation Scale.

FFS – Fee For Service. Type of contract that uses performance based billings as the method of payment.

FOIA - Freedom of Information Act.

FQHC - Federally Qualified Health Center

FTE – Full Time Equivalent is the aggregated number of employees supported by the program. Can include employees providing direct services (Direct FTE) to clients and indirect employees such as supervisors or management (Indirect FTE).

FY – Fiscal Year, for the county runs from December to following November. Changing in 2015 to January through December.

GAF – Global Assessment of Functioning. A subjective rating scale used by clinicians to rate a client's level of social, occupational and psychological functioning. The scale included in the DSM-IV has been replaced in the DSM-V by another instrument.

GAIN-Q - Global Appraisal of Individual Needs-Quick. Is the most basic form of the assessment tool taking about 30 minutes to complete and consists of nine items that identify and estimate the severity of problems of the youth or adult.

GAIN Short Screen - Global Appraisal of Individual Needs, is made up of 20 items (four five-item subscales). The GAIN-SS subscales identify: internalizing disorders, externalizing disorders, substance use disorders, crime/violence.

HRSA – Health Resources and Services Administration. The agency is housed within the federal Department of Health and Human Resources and has responsibility for Federally Qualified Health Centers.

MHP - Mental Health Professional. Rule 132 term. Typically refers to a bachelors level staff providing services under the supervision of a QMHP.

MIDD – A dual diagnosis of Mental Illness and Developmental Disability.

MISA – A dual diagnosis condition of Mental Illness and Substance Abuse

NTPC -- NON - Treatment Plan Clients - This is a new client engaged in a given quarter with case records but no treatment plan - includes: recipients of material assistance, non-responsive outreach cases, cases closed before a plan was written because the client did not want further service beyond first few contacts or cases assessed for another agency. It is a category of service measurement providing an actual number of those served in the prior program year and a projection for the coming program year on the Part II utilization form application/program plan and the actual activity to be performed should also be described in the Part I Program Performance Measures-Utilization section of the application. Similar to TPCs, they may be divided into two groups - Continuing NTPCs - clients without treatment plans served before the first day of July and actively receiving services within the first quarter of the new program year. The first quarter of the program year is the only quarter in which this data is reported. Essentially it is a case carried from one program year into the next. The other is New TPCs that is the number of new clients in a given quarter of the program year.

NREPP – National Registry of Evidence-based Programs and Practices maintained by Substance Abuse Mental Health Services Administration (SAMHSA)

OMA – Open Meetings Act.

PAS – Pre-Admission Screening

PCI – Parent Child Interaction groups.

PCP – Person Centered Planning

PLAY – Play and Language for Autistic Youngsters. PLAY is an early intervention approach that teaches parents ways to interact with their child who has autism that promotes developmental progress.

PLL – Parenting with Love and Limits. Evidenced based program providing group and family therapy targeting youth/families involved in juvenile justice system.

PTSD – Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder



PUNS – Prioritization of Urgency of Need for Services. PUNS is a database implemented by the Illinois Department of Human Services to assist with planning and prioritization of services for individuals with disabilities based on level of need. An individuals' classification of need may be emergency, critical or planning.

PY – Program Year, runs from July to following June. For example PY08 is July 1, 2007 to June 30, 2008. (Also may be referred to as Contract Year – CY and is often the Agency Fiscal Year)

QCPS – Quarter Cent for Public Safety. The funding source for the Juvenile Justice Post Detention program applications. May also be referred to as Quarter Cent.

QIDP - Qualified Intellectual Disabilities Professional

QMHP – Qualified Mental Health Professional. Rule 132 term, that simply stated refers to a Master's level clinician with field experience that has been licensed.

SA – Substance Abuse

SAMHSA – Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, a division of the federal Department of Health and Human Services

SASS – Screening Assessment and Support Services is a state program that provides crisis intervention for children and youth on Medicaid or uninsured.

SBIRT – Screening, Brief Intervention, Referral to Treatment. SAMHSA defines SBIRT as a comprehensive, integrated, public health approach to the delivery of early intervention and treatment services for persons with substance use disorders, as well as those who are at risk of developing these disorders.

SCs - Service Contacts/Screening Contacts. This is the number of phone and face-to-face contacts with consumers who may or may not have open cases in the program. It can include information and referral contacts or initial screenings/assessments or crisis services. May sometimes be referred to as a service encounter (SE). It is a category of service measurement providing a picture of the volume of activity in the prior program year and a projection for the coming program year on the Part II utilization form of the application/program plan and the actual activity to be performed should also be described in the Part I Program Performance Measures-Utilization section of the application.

Seeking Safety - a present-focused treatment for clients with a history of trauma and substance abuse.

SEL – Social Emotional Learning



SFI – Savannah Family Institute. Manages the Parenting with Love and Limits (PLL) model.

TALKS - TALKS Mentoring (Transferring A Little Knowledge Systematically)

TPCs - Treatment Plan Clients – This is the number of service recipients with case records and treatment plans. It is a category of service measurement providing an actual number of those served in the prior program year and a projection for the coming program year on the Part II utilization form of the application/program plan and the actual activity to be performed should also be described in the Part I Program Performance Measures-Utilization section of the application. Treatment Plan Clients may be divided into two groups – Continuing TPCs - clients with treatment plans written prior to the first day of July and actively receiving services within the first quarter of the new program year. The first quarter of the program year is the only quarter in which this data is reported. Essentially it is a case carried from one program year into the next. The other is New TPCs that is the number of new clients with treatment plans written in a given quarter of the program year.

WHODAS – World Health Organization Disability Assessment Schedule. It is a generic assessment instrument for health and disability and can be used across all diseases, including mental and addictive disorders. The instrument covers 6 domains: Cognition, Mobility; Self-care; Getting along; Life activities; and Participation. Replaces the Global Assessment of Functioning in the DSM-V.

WRAP – Wellness Recovery Action Plan, is a manualized group intervention for adults that guides participants through the process of identifying and understanding their personal wellness resources and then helps them develop an individualized plan to use these resources on a daily basis to manage their mental illness.
